She was first employed at the Chesley Enterprise and later in Georgetown and Toronto. She was married in 1941 to Mr. Hockley and they had since resided in Toronto.

Surviving are her husband, a brother and two sisters, Henry and Martha of Chesley and Mrs. Roy Hauser of Millbank. The funeral service was held in a Toronto funeral chapel on April 13th, with interment in Glendale Memorial Gardens.

NEW TELEPHONE BOOK WILL INCLUDE BRAMPTON DIALS

Delivery of the latest edition of the telephone directory got under way in Georgetown this week. The new book contains hundreds of new and changed listings, including all of the two-letter, five-figure numbers coming into effect in Brampton.

L. G. Denby, Bell Telephone manager for this region, emphasized the fact that the Brampton section of the new directory will not become effective until Sunday, May 5, the date that the No. 5 Crossbar dial system, and the two-letter, five-figure numbering plan, are introduced. Brampton's new exchange designation will be Glendale-1.

To avoid the possibility of calling wrong numbers, telephone users would be wise to check their "Blue Books of Telephone Numbers" against listings as they appear in the new directory," said Mr. Denby. He said that this should be carried out on May 5.

The Bell manager explained that the blue books are useful for listing the local and out-of-town numbers most frequently called. Fresh copies, regular and pocket sized, can be obtained from any Bell office, he said.

Besides Bell subscribers in Georgetown and Brampton, the new telephone book lists those in Milton, Orangeville, Shelburne and surrounding territory.

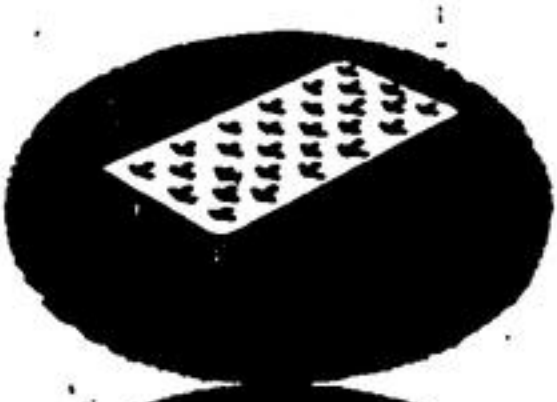
