

Georgetown has been severaly Board for overspending an appro-riticized by the Ontario Municipal | ved \$84,000 for widening and resurfacing the highway last year.

A letter from the board was read at the April 29th council meeting in which the board expressed surprise that final cost of the highway was \$124,000, and that no further approval had been sought until now to issue debentures for the extra costs.

Mayor Armstrong said at the meeting that there are several explanations for the greatly increased cost. Original estimating for the widening had been done years ago and several changes and additions to plans had been made. Council was somewhat at faul, he said, in not checking more closely into costs and requiring more progress reports as the work pogressed.



ound town and to Glen. Williams. Bonfires downtown, music and dancing in the arena where the team was given an official reception followed.


