



PASSING THE BUCK

'A buck lamb does not make a quality meat product. Our lamb and mutton consumption has dropped from a pre-war level of 5.6 lbs. per person, to an estimated 2.7 lbs. in 1956.

On the other hand, beef and poultry producers, by improving their product, have greatly stimuated domestic sales. Faced with stiff competition at the retail counter from the other red meats and poultry, and from New Zealand and Australian sheep men who are anxious to send their product to this country, Canadian lamb producers should be satisfied with nothing but the best - and

buck lambs are not the best. Thirty years ago, buck lambs constituted 8.7% of the total sheep and lamb sales. As a result of an education campaign the number of buck lambs had been reduced to Office Supplies Ltd. Last year, however, buck lambs constituted 10% of Canada's total sheep and lamb marketings.


