## Completes Ph.D. Work Will Work in Ottawa

Back in Canada after a four-year stay in England, Mr. and Mrs. Andrew Molozzi have been visiting in town with her mother, Mrs. C. Sargent, 71 Charles St. prior to going to Ottawa where they will make their future home.

One of Georgetown High School's most brilliant graduates, Mr. Molozzi will soon become "Dr. Molozzi" having completed work on his Doctor of Philosophy degree in electronics overseas. He has been advised that his post-graduate studies have been successful and will get formal notification later of his degree.

After graduating from University of Toronto, he was awarded an Athlone scholarship which took him overseas. He has been studying at City & Guilds, Imperial College, a division of the University of London, where he first received a D.L.C. degree, the Canadian equivalent of which is Master of Science.

## Chatting

with M. H. B.

DRIVING DOWN the new Maple Avenue extension today I noted anew the beauty of the little valley thru which it cuts. The changing seasons all being to it their own special charm. Winding thru tree-studded meadows, the stream seems always to set the mood for the scene. Today it fairly laughed as the spring sun turned it to quicksilver. Even the trunks of the elms and maples seems a richer brown against the vividness of new grass. . . . That was on Friday, a beautiful day, and so help me, if I could write poetry, I'd be inflicting a poem on you right now.

ANOTHER LITTLE spring-time scene comes to mind, from Saturday this time. This one wouldn't exactly inspire poetry, but it could have inspired an artist. We were driving just ahead of that evil-looking storm in the afternoon, and glancing apprehensively to our right, a grove of silver birch trees atop a small knoll caught our attention. Silhouetted against the black sky, the brightness of their white trunks and yellow green foliage made a vivid contrast.

IN COMMON WITH everyone else, springtime gives me the urge to get into old duds and take a walk in the country. I'd hate to admit how long that. Why knows, perhaps I really will make it this year. Seems that cars have spoiled us. To truly savour the country one must go on foot, or bicycle, or horseback. Our New Canadians often mention their surprise at how little walking we in Canada do. Perhaps we might follow their example to find renewed pleasure in our countryside.

WHILE WE ALL enjoy our scenery I'm sure even if it is from a car window, there is one group of people who are actively engaged in doing something about preserving its beauty as well as its usefulness. They are members of the Conservation Authorities. In a recent issue of "Our Valley" published by the Department of Planning & Development, it tells of the scenic route being planned along the Credit Valley. . . . The route, beginning at Port Credit and following the Credit River upstream to Orangeville, will be approximately sixty-two miles long. A map is to be prepared for distribution to the public and the signs are to be placed marking the route and indicating points of special interest. It is intended that the work of marking the route will be completed by early spring. Sounds like a pleasant Sunday afternoon drive, doesn't it.

ANOTHER AREA the conservation authorities are very interested in is the Hart Lake area, described as being five miles north of Brampton and ten miles from the boundaries of metropolitan Toronto. There is an aerial photo of the lake, showing it small and truly heart-shaped. It is fringed with woodlands. This area has been purchased by the Authority with a view to preserving it as a park land and recreation centre. That will be another Sunday drive for us, because although I've lived here all my life, I have never been to Hart Lake. Had never even heard of it before, in fact, until reading about it in "Our Valley".

ONE OF THE strongest ties which bind Scotsmen to their homeland is the memory of the grandeur of Highland scenery. This observation is confirmed in a little Scottish book lent me by Mrs. Walter Gray, 6 Church Street. In addition, the book contains illustrations of all the Scottish tartans with historical sketches of the clans and families of Scotland. I was surprised by the number, . . . there are nearly one hundred different tartans. The book also contains a directory of Scottish family names together with the clans. Just for fun, I looked up the names of Scottish families in town that I could think of. Sure enough, they're all listed there.

A really comprehensive little book, the author tells us that the highland dress is of extreme antiquity . . . sculptured resemblances of it are to be found on ancient stones in various parts of the country. Still going back to ancient times, to the origin of clans, the Highlands were divided into great tribal districts, each ruled by a great Chief (later Earl). Excepting the Lords of the Isles and the Princes of Galloway, they owed allegiance to a supreme Chief, who became in due course, the King of Scots.

How were the Chieftains chosen? . . . It was every Chief's claim that his progenitor was the first to have "raised smoke and dilled water" on that land. Every member of the same clan had a common surname. A clan was thus a family, and through the centuries, they

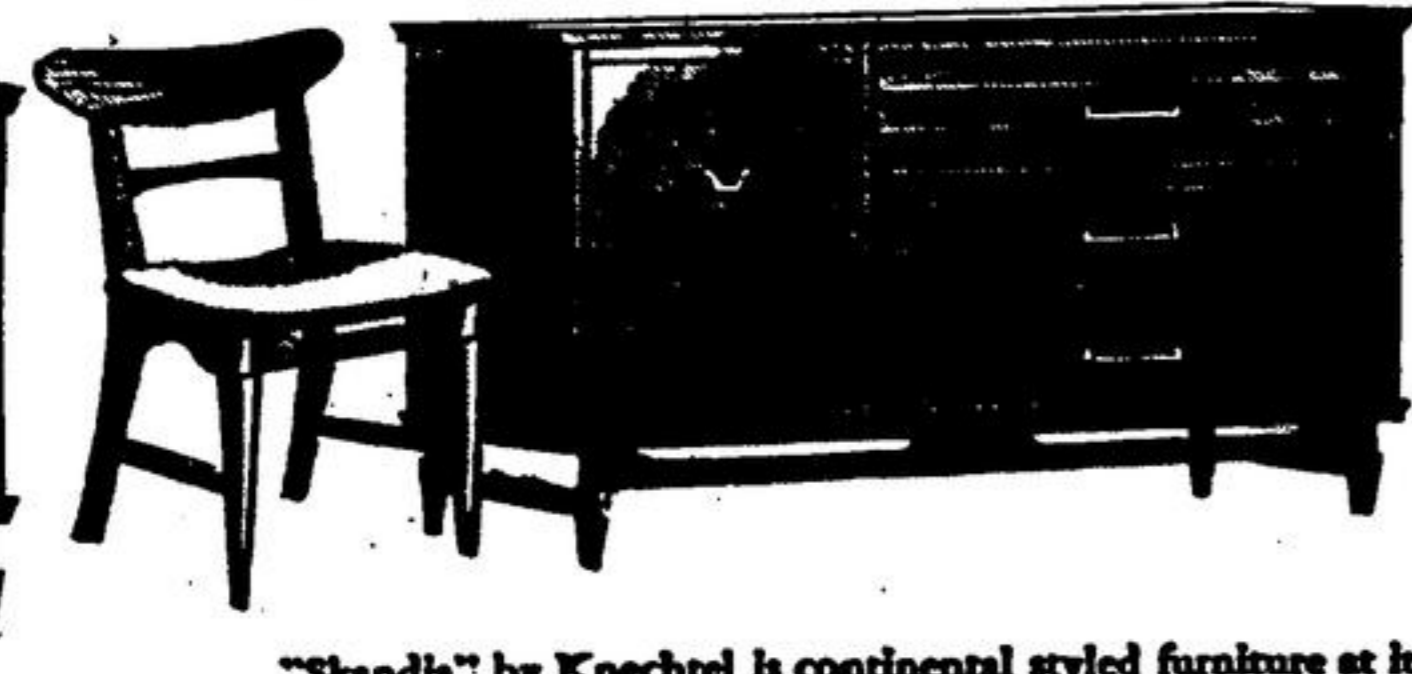
