Mrs. Damude, accompanied by son Brian, age 12, and daughter Janie, age 9, will fly to join Dr. Damude in Rio at the end of May.

## FARM NEWS New Warble Treatment Experiment Looks Good

This past winter the Ontario Veterinary College in cooperation with a group of farmers in North Halton, tested out a new product for control of Warbles. This new material or chemical is given orally or internally. The young cattle were treated during the month of January. In each farmer co-operator's herd, equal numbers of the young cattle were selected for treatment and for non treatment to act as a check on the effectiveness of the treatment. While a complete report has not as yet been released, it is our understanding that between five and six hundred animals were treated and a similar number were identified for check purposes.

A few days ago we learned that of 823 cattle checked recently 431 treated cattle had a total of 18 Warbles up, while the 392 head untreated were showing a total of 2854 Warble lumps in their backs. The experiment was conducted by the Ontario Veterinary College, with Dr. A. R. Campbell, formerly secretary of the Canadian Guernsey Breeders' Association, in charge of the field work.

We can't tell you the name of the material, nor what the cost of treatment would be. It is still in the experimental stage and has not yet been licensed for use in either Canada or the United States. However, it does look interesting and the data would suggest that

Halton cattlemen this coming fall and winter should do something in an organized way to get rid of Warbles. Just imagine, 2854 Warbles on the backs of 392 young cattle. Halton is about the only county in this part of Ontario that is not under the Warble Fly Control Act.

### CHRYSLER APPOINTS NEW ADVERTISING MANAGER

Franz W. Martin of Windsor has been appointed advertising manager of Chrysler Corporation of Canada, Limited, according to an announcement by C. O. Hurley, vice-president in charge of sales.

Mr. Martin joined the company 22 years ago and for the past 11 years has been a member of the sales division organization, latterly as sales staff executive.

He was born in Windsor 43 years ago and is a graduate of the schools of this city as well as of Chrysler Institute of Engineering and the Conference of Business Management.

### Five Million Profits Grand Union Record

Record net income of \$5,049,315 for The Grand Union Company during the 52-week fiscal year ended March 2nd, 1957, a gain of 41% over net income of \$3,584,125 for the 53-week fiscal year ended March 3, 1956, was reported by Lansing P. Shield, President of the Eastern food chain in the company's annual report mailed to stockholders.

Earnings after taxes were \$2.43 per share of common stock during fiscal 1956, based on the 1,979,102 shares outstanding at the close of the year.

Sales of Grand Union, one of the ten largest food chains in the nation, also set a new record during fiscal 1956. They totalled \$374,155,488, which was 32.2% higher than 1955.

During the 1956 fiscal year, cash dividends of 60¢ per share of common stock were paid to shareholders, as well as a 5% stock dividend.

Grand Union net earnings have virtually tripled and sales have more than doubled since 1952, according to a five-year review of operations in the report.

While noting that earnings and sales were the highest in the 84-year history of Grand Union during 1956, Mr. Shield told stockholders that steps taken during the year to insure continued future growth were of even greater significance.

He cited the doubling in size of the Grand Union market in Keansburg, N.J. to accommodate a non-foods department carrying some 15,000 items of merchandise as "an admittedly experimental development—but one presaging the scope of supermarkets to come."

Another innovation during the year was round-the-clock shopping through a battery of eight vending machines recessed into the front of Grand Union's "headquarters" supermarket in East Paterson, N.J., where customers may obtain as many as 50 different food items at any hour of the day or night.

"Still experimental," Mr. Shield reported, "this installation is providing needed experience to guide the company in its exploration of the yet uncharted field of automation as applied to retail selling."

Grand Union's entry into the deep South for the first time was cited as the highlight of the chain's 1956 expansion program. Since last June, Grand Union has acquired nine food markets and opened one in Miami, Florida.

A total of twenty-eight new supermarkets were opened by Grand Union during the 1956 fiscal year. 17 were acquired and 6 enlarged and renovated. Thirty-four outmoded stores, many of them service units, were closed. At year's end, the chain was operating 356 food markets in nine states, the District of Columbia and Canada. This compares with 345 stores in operation at the beginning of the year.

Plans for the current fiscal year call for the opening of some 41 new Grand Union markets.

### Clean-Up Campaign Boosted by Chamber

The Chamber of Commerce, at its meeting last Tuesday, budgeted \$50,000 to cooperate with the horticultural society in a "Clean-up, Paint Up" campaign.

Harold Marshall and Ollie Dyson will form a committee to encourage residents to beautify their homes this spring.

There was some discussion at the meeting on formation of a credit bureau locally. A local resident has expressed interest in operating a bureau and it was reported that a minimum of 25 businessmen would be needed in order to ensure its operation.

Requested by the volunteer ambulance association to assist in securing more volunteers and cooperation from smaller businessmen, the Chamber agreed to send letters to businessmen outlining the plan which was suggested at the meeting by Chief Ralph Hawes, Ed Hall
