

## You Don't Have to Pay Such High Taxes



The people of Halton County are paying higher taxes every year. The present Liberal Government is responsible for this sorry state of affairs.

Facts prove the truth of this statement. Under the last Progressive Conservative Government at Ottawa the federal share of the national tax dollar (total amount raised by all taxes in Canada) was 43 per cent. By 1954, under the present Liberal Government, the federal "share" was up to 78 per cent. Today, still under

They realize that a vote for the Liberals is a vote for higher taxes, while a vote for the Progressive Conservatives is a vote for government efficiency and lower taxes.

## CLOTHING STORES NEXT ON MONDAY CLOSING LIST

General Monday closing of Georgetown stores seems probable within a few weeks.

Clothing stores have petitioned to follow the lead of grocers, meat stores, barbers and hairdressers in asking for legislation for Monday closing and all-day-Thursday opening. It is probable that other merchant groups may submit similar petitions to council, as some have signed a petition asking for this which is technically improper, as separate petitions must be received for each line of business.

On Thursday, council received a petition signed by all five clothing stores asking that the closing by-law be amended to change their hours to those now in effect for grocers and barbers. The petition was signed by Cotton Bros., Henry's Clothing, Garber's, McMurdo's and Silver's.

Mayor Armstrong suggested that the petition not be dealt with that evening, to save council time and money in amending a by-law several times when once might suffice. He said he had seen a petition which included other merchants, which could not be accepted as action must be taken by classification. The mayor said he assumed that those who signed the general petition, which included jewelers, variety stores and shoe stores, would also be petitioning and that council could act on all petitions at one time if this occurred.

Only opponents of those to whom a closing by-law applies appear to be the hardware stores, none of whom signed the closing petition.

#### Claims Toronto Daily Politically Biased

Sir: I read with interest a lengthy article by Mr. Grey Hamilton, a writer for the Globe & Mail, outlining his views on the election picture in Halton.

Neither the C.C.F. or organized labor are strangers to biased views from the press. We have only to think back a few decades to when the press referred to workers who carried union cards as being comparable to outlaws, and the C.C.F. as being reactionary.

The attitude of the press has definitely broadened since that time, and we look hopefully toward the day when these powerful influences on the public mind will remain neutral in politics.

However, articles like Mr. Hamilton's, in which the combined efforts of the C.C.F. and labor, to elect their representative to Parliament are dismissed with little more than a disapproving nod, remind us sharply, that although the day of the impartial press may be getting closer, it definitely has not yet arrived.

Some of the Toronto daily papers would be well advised to take a lesson from all of the weekly papers in Halton County who up until this time at least have been fair to all parties, in their editorials. One paper has already devoted a half page free of charge for the purpose of allowing all parties to state their platforms in an effort to (a) educate their readers on political matters; (b) create interest in elections, and (c) get out the vote.
