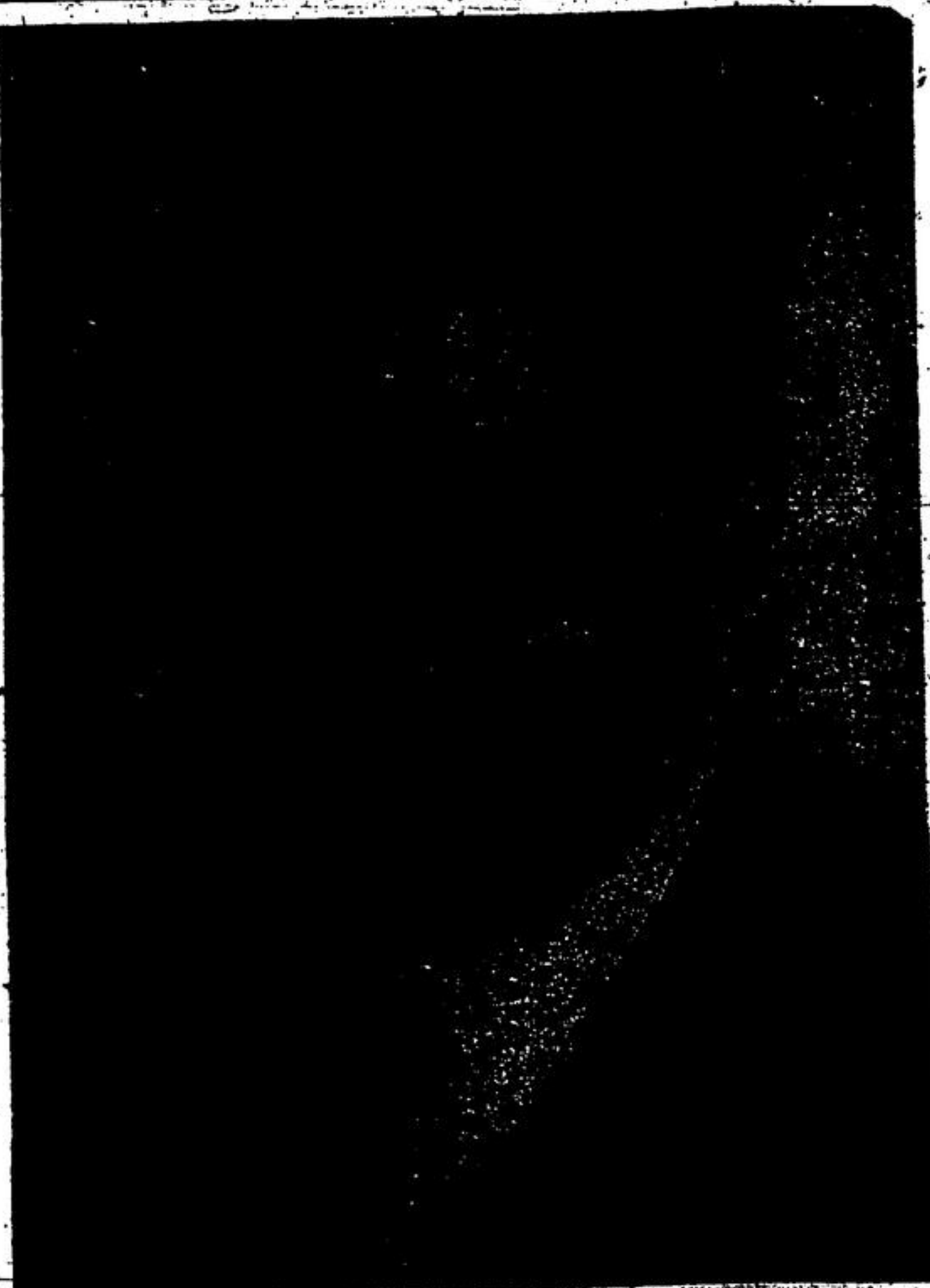

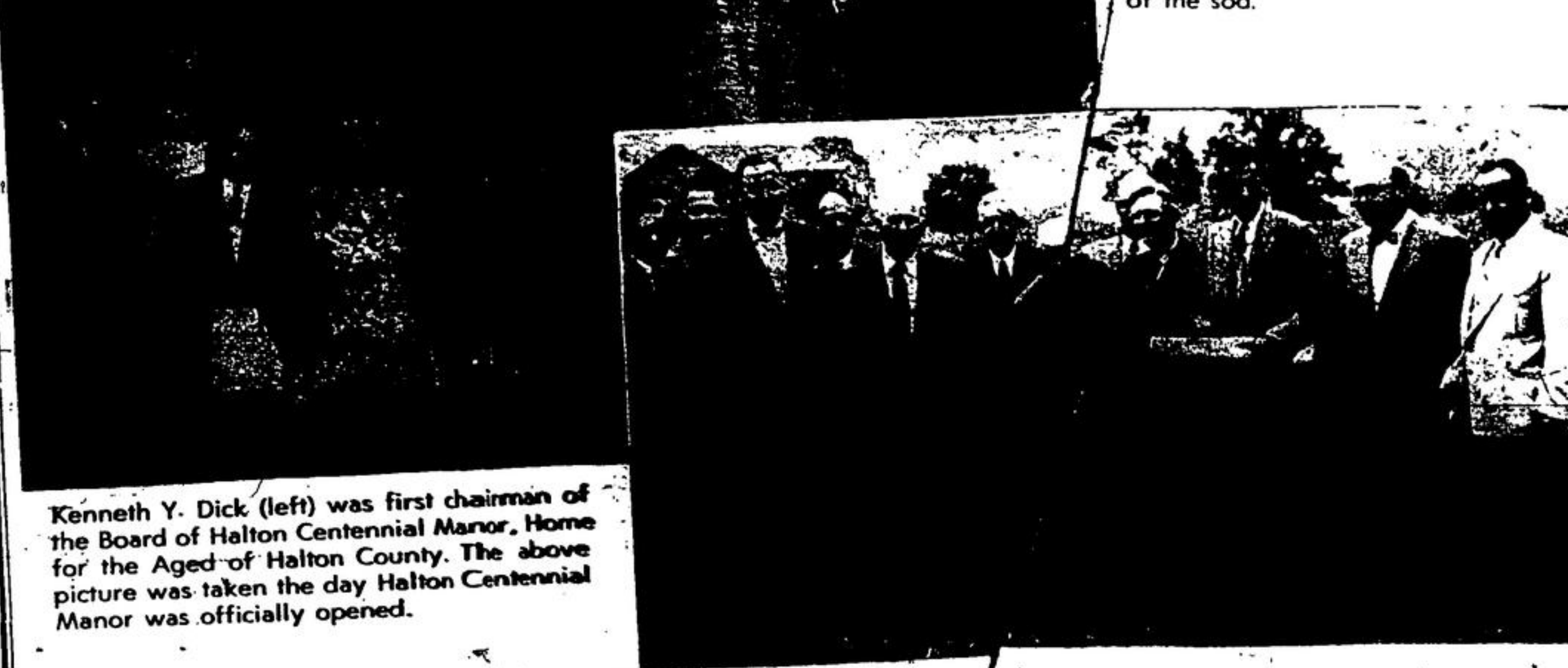
A Pictorial Presentation of Ken Y. Dick Liberal Candidate For Halton

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Three Opposed, \$8.00 Meeting Fee Voted In

With three council members voting in opposition, a motion to increase the meeting fee of Georgetown councillors to \$8 was carried by a majority vote at a council meeting Thursday. Up to the present councillors have been receiving \$6.00 a meeting.

The matter of the expense allowance was brought up by Mayor Armstrong, who said he had discovered that when the allowance was raised to \$6.00 a few years ago, this had not been properly done as an amendment to the by-law and should be rectified. Recent provincial legislation has set \$8.00 as the maximum fee, and he recommended that council consider the raise at the same time as a by-law amendment was passed.

The \$8.00 motion, proposed by Crs. Harrison and McGillvray, met opposition from Deputy Reeve Doug Sargent and Crs. Walter Gray and Ern Hyde.

"I think this year we should get along on our present allowance," said Cr. Hyde. "The job may be worth more, but I think it is poor psychology to raise our own salaries at the same time we are refusing to put in a drain."

"I think we'll be severely criticized if we raise the fee" was Cr. Gray's opinion.

"That's true, but that would happen whenever a raise was made," was Reeve Stan Allen's answer.

"All we need to say is 'Run for the job yourself if you're not satisfied,'" said Cr. Harrison.

A suggestion by Cr. McGillvray that council also consider increasing the mayor's allowance also was not discussed further at the meeting. Cr. McGillvray cited the many hours the mayor spends in administration and said he felt there should be an increase for him at the same time.

Cr. Harrison asked for a recorded vote on the motion, and the mayor joined with the motion movers, Reeve Allen and Crs. Harry Hale and Alfred Sykes in passing it.

The Navy League was granted permission to hold a tag day in Georgetown June 20, 21, 22. Georgetown Hospital Committee was granted similar permission for October 3, 4, 5.
