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UNITED CHURCH TEAMS TOURING MISSIONARIES

Caravanning by bus, train, car, truck, tractor, aeroplane and boat will be the experience of some 300 young people of The United Church of Canada this summer.

A Christian Youth Caravan team is a group of four or five young people witnessing in the name of the Church in a community where there is a special need for a vital witness.

In past summers across Canada teams served on Indian Reserves, on student mission fields, on large rural charges, in a children's hospital, in military camps, in lumbering communities, in new housing areas and in the frontier areas of our country. This summer it is expected that there will be an emphasis on Indian work and work in down town churches.

In British Columbia teams have been flown to Northern coastal outposts. In Newfoundland teams have been taken in the Church's mission boat to isolated areas and in all provinces between Caravaners traveled by bus, train, car, truck and tractor to reach their areas of service. The significant thing about members of Christian Youth Caravan teams is that they are all volunteers, they are not paid. Among the volunteers of last summer were teachers, farmers, nurses, students, factory and office workers. Some served for seven weeks while others served for varying periods. The minimum length of service was two weeks.

Teams this summer will hold Church Vacation Schools, assist with services of worship, give leadership at youth rallies, conduct religious surveys, make home visits and perform many other services in the name of The United Church of Canada. Their work in a community varies with the needs of the particular locality. Last summer in a large military camp a vacation school was held for 500 children while on a small Indian Reserve home visitation was a major project.

Of special importance last summer was an experiment conducted by a team in a children's sanitarium. Caravaners brought the joy of a church vacation school to children confined to their beds.

Two summers ago 14 Ontario young people offered their lives for full-time service in the church

as a result of Christian Youth Caravan work, and across Canada a significant additional number of young people have entered United Church theological colleges and the United Church Training School in order to prepare for full-time work in the church. Many of the young people who pioneered in the Caravan movement in Canada are now serving the church as ministers, directors of Christian education, missionaries and deaconesses.

The Christian Youth Caravan movement began in The United Church of Canada in the summer of 1949 and from that time it has grown steadily in every province. The Rev. Beverly Oaten, Paris, is chairman of the national committee which is a part of the youth department of the Board of Christian Education. Miss Nancy McCalla, youth secretary of The United Church of Canada is secretary of the committee and Miss Betty Bone, director of the summer's work.

Letters of inquiry will be sent to the committee responsible in the area where the applicant lives. Applicants should be eighteen years of age or over, with at least Grade 10, with at least two weeks of holidays to give to the work of the church, and with some experience in leadership in church groups.

Dairymen Welcome Powder Milk Floor

The recently announced floor price under milk powder will help restore the confidence of all sections of the dairy industry. This is the view of Gordon Lovelidge, president of Dairy Farmers of Canada, who asserts that milk for manufacturing purposes has been selling at depressed prices and that the action will materially benefit this part of the industry.

Dry skim milk powder will be supported on the basis of 17 cents a pound for No. 1 grade spray process powder and 14 cents for No. 1 grade roller process powder at storage points across Canada to be designated by the Agricultural Prices Support Board. Mr. Lovelidge further stated:

"Assistance to the manufacturing milk producer will enable dairymen to plan their production to take care of the increasing demands of the Canadian people. If the dairy requirements of Canada are to be adequately taken care of by Canadian dairymen, small surpluses are bound to occur, and these have always had a depressing effect on the whole industry. With floor prices under skim powder and butter much of this will be removed.

The Dairy Farmers of Canada have asked many times for the more generous use of the Agricultural Prices Support Act, and at realistic prices well above the distress level. It is gratifying that our requests have been acceded to in this case.

It is the aim of the Dairy Farmers of Canada that if the dairy industry is given assistance such as is accorded most other industries in Canada, in one form or another, that the production and marketing of dairy products can be carried on with the minimum of government assistance and intervention."
