DAMAGE \$1500 WHEN CAR CLIPS HYDRO POLE

Gordon C. Patmore, 30 Brubacher St., Kitchener was lucky to escape with his life Saturday morning when his car left the highway north of the white bridge and plunged into the west ditch where it sheered off a hydro pole bearing a heavy transformer.

Mr. Patmore was taken to Dr. O. M. Brewster's office, 63 Main St. north where he was treated for a cut over his left eye, skinned knees and multiple bruises. The front end of the car, a '56 Buick, was completely demolished by the impact which brought the transformer and live cables down within a few feet of the car. Mr. Patmore was driving south on the highway at the time.

The total damage has been estimated at \$1500, \$500 to the car and \$700 to the hydro pole and equipment. The accident was investigated by Cpl. Jim Bilshaw.
