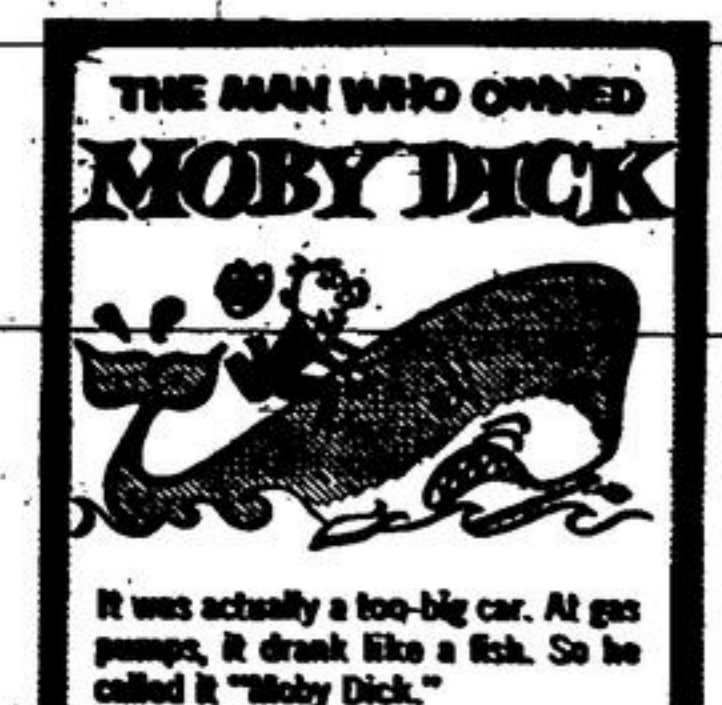

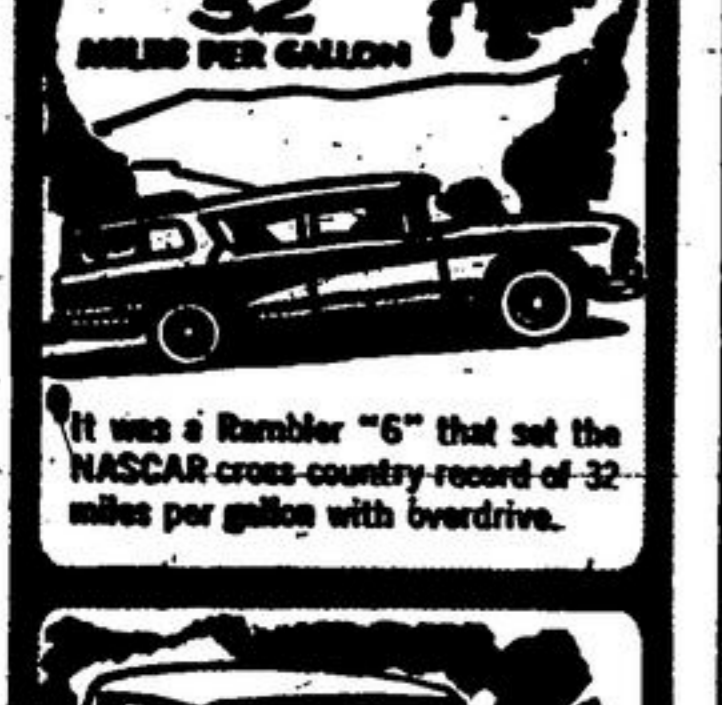

It even had fins like a fish. Parking it was like trying to squeeze a whale into a godfish bowl.

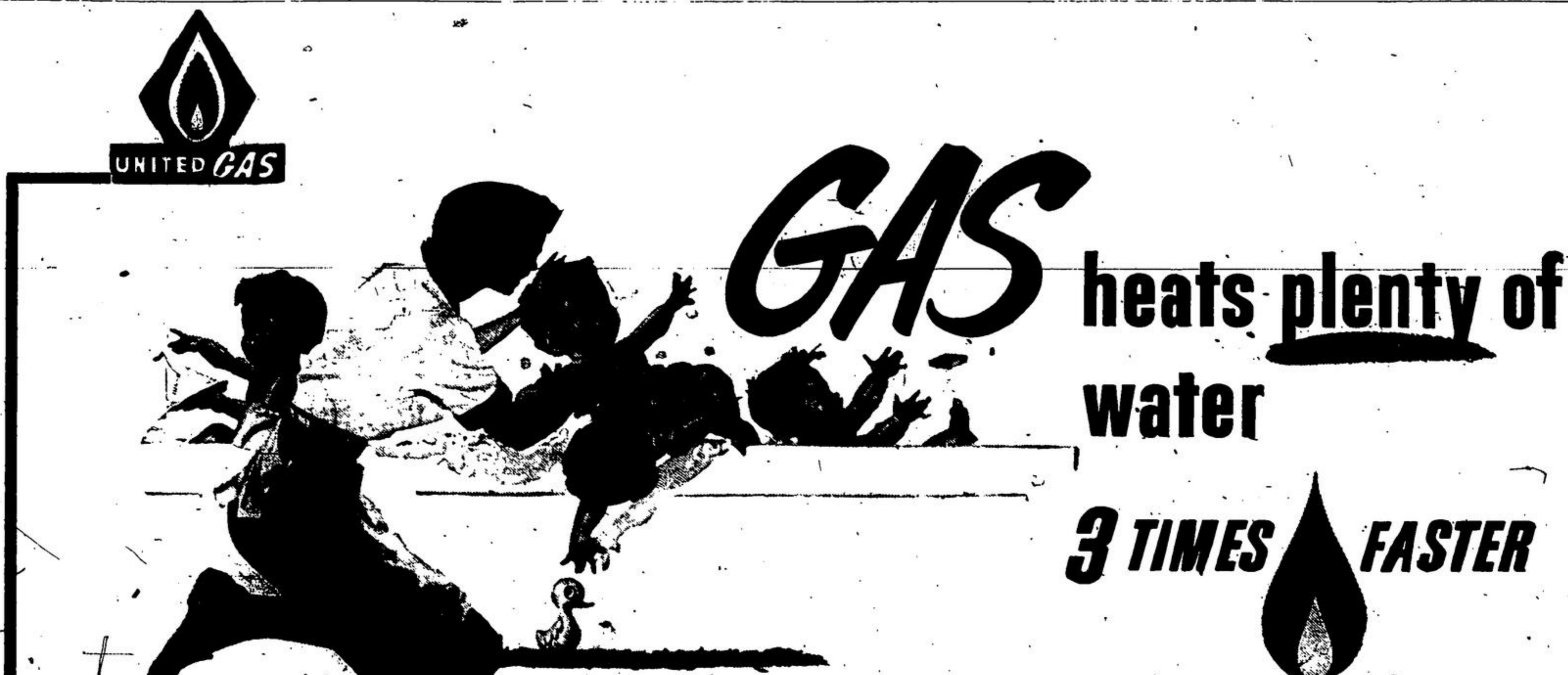
