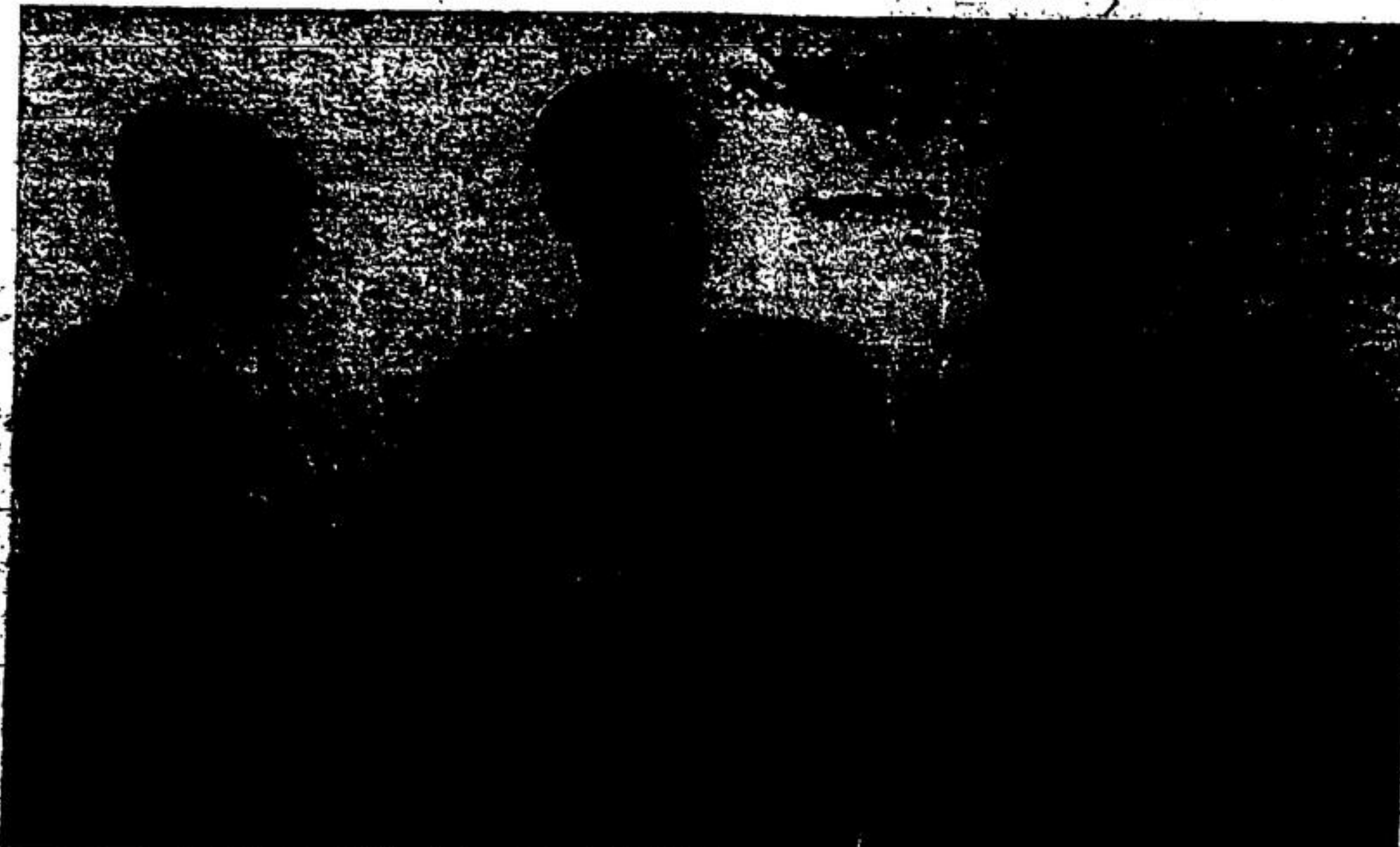

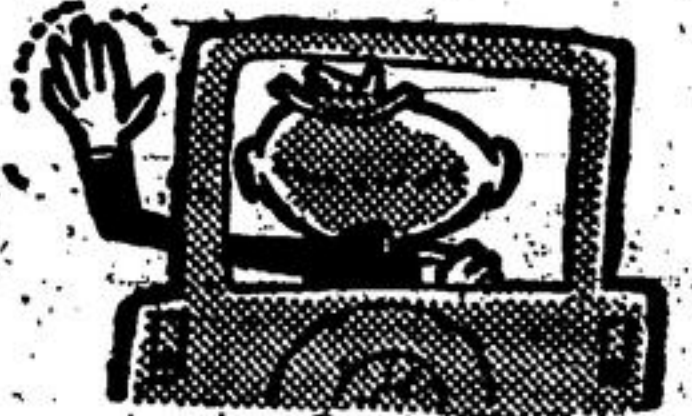

Overtaxed? How About New Houses, Cars, TV Dick at Acton

Addressing a large audience at Acton Friday night, Kenneth Y. Dick, the Halton County Liberal candidate, came out with a strong attack against statements attributed to the Conservative candidate in election advertising.

Mr. Dick said the Conservative candidate is using the following statement: "Like other Canadians, people of this county recognize a serious problem. A government has overtaxed causing misery and hardship for thousands."

"This has been appearing over the Conservative candidate's signature," Mr. Dick stated, "yet the same candidate says he has rung 8,000 door bells in the riding. 'I have been ringing door bells, too, and generally they are attached to new houses. Frequently, there is a late model car parked in the driveway. Nearly always there is a TV antenna on the roof. Over the shoulder of the door there is usually evidence of an electric vacuum cleaner or an electric washing machine or some other appliance."

"There are 12,000 new voters in Halton county," Mr. Dick told his audience, "and not one of them is living in slum conditions. The gentleman who signed that statement," said Mr. Dick, "is conducting two businesses in Halton, a beef cattle enterprise in Nassagaweya township and the growing of lilies in Esqueping. Presumably, both businesses are prospering or they would not be continuing."
