Withdraws Request For 500 Semi-Detached Bungalows

No Discussion Monday Delrex Action Surprise

Further discussion on a request by Delrex Developments for permission to build 500 semi-detached bungalows on land backing the new Sykes Tool plant, was halted at Monday's council meeting when a letter was read from the company withdrawing its application for the time being.

Rex Heslop and Harold Baird who outlined the proposal in detail at three previous council meetings were present at the meeting, but made no comment on the decision stated in the letter.

Prior to correspondence being read, five of several ratepayers who attended the meeting commented briefly on the Delrex proposal.

Miss Gladys Fraser, who operates the Spot on 7 restaurant opposite the property, asked council to consider carefully before allowing anything which might detract from an attractive entrance to town.

Harrison Wood urged consideration by council before making any decision. Present home owners are faced with higher taxes to carry Delrex, in his opinion, and he felt the town should have more industry before any more housing.

"I am interested in your Delrex problem, but I am not conversant enough with it to offer any opinion," said Rex Cok, who appeared before council on another matter.

The Georgetown hydro commission reported that profits on the present extensions into Delrex do not warrant any further large scale extension until more of the services installed at the subdividers request are being used.

Hallon Health Unit wrote that it would recommend no approval to plans for any individual sewage disposal system in a subdivision.

"I am impressed with the number of people assembled here tonight to listen to council business," said Mayor Armstrong, "and I hope every one of you come back to attend future meetings."

The mayor said he realized attendance might be influenced by the importance of the issue with which council is dealing at the moment, but many nights there is no audience and councilors sometimes wonder if anyone is interested in what they are deciding.

"We are nine men entrusted with the affairs of a town of 6500" he said, "and it would be a fine thing if we had to enlarge the council chamber to accommodate people who have comment to make on municipal matters."

Another Tie Game Registered In Soccer

Georgetown's soccer club had to come from behind last Saturday afternoon in managing a 2-2 tie with the Hamilton Moose Hearts at Georgetown Park in picking up their second point of the young season. The draw extended their winless streak to four straight games, but it was the second contest in succession in which the club showed signs of regaining last year's strength.

Both teams wanted this one in a bad way and indicated it in their fierce play. Georgetown found holes in the Hamilton defence early in the game and had more than one chance to break the contest wide open. Jim Crichton had about the best opportunity. The ratty centre-forward worked into scoring position and then lobbed the shot over the top of the net. Koch followed that up with a hard drive that had goal written all over it but the shot veered off at the last second and hit the side of the mesh.

The Moose Hearts broke quickly down the left wing just minutes later in a rush that ended in their first goal. The Hamilton centre-forward was credited with the tally which was briefly disputed by the locals. The score gave the Hamilton club the spark they needed and three minutes later they were two up. The second goal came when a defensive lapse allowed the Hamilton centre to carry right in on Vic Robins who had no chance to block the shot.

The Moose Hearts kept up the pressure and almost extended the lead to three on one threat in particular but this time Robins came up with the ball. Before the end of the half Georgetown ran into injury trouble, when Dixon had to leave the field after colliding with one of the Hamilton players Bill Cann moved into the right half slot and Terry Slaven took over at inside right. Dixon's injury was not serious, however, and the delay gave Georgetown time to re-organize.

Moments after play resumed James Monfeath rapped one in for the locals and that is the way it stood at half time Hamilton 2 and Georgetown 1.

The locals got the jump on the Moose Hearts early in the second half as Slaven netted the equalizer from 20 feet out after faking a pass that threw the rearguards off balance. Georgetown had little trouble in holding them from thereon in, and with a couple of breaks would have had their first win. Crichton, Robins, Koch, Slaven, Reeves and Freddie Allen were standouts for the locals.

Henry Hosking MP Dies June Election Delayed

Monday's election in Wellington South has been cancelled due to the death of Liberal M.P. Henry Hosking, a candidate for re-election.

New nominations will be called within the next 30 days, with an election following a few weeks later.

Mr. Hosking, 49, had been a member of parliament since 1949, and prior to that a Guelph councillor. His wife, the former Muriel Pearl of Rockwood is a sister of Mrs. Calvin Clark, Wyoming, a former Georgetown resident.

Mr. Hosking died in St. Joseph's Hospital, Guelph on Monday where he had been critically ill for two weeks. His death ended a brilliant career which saw him voted the outstanding student of his class when he received his B.Sc. at Queen's University in 1933. He served as an RCE captain overseas in World War II and operated a car dealership in Guelph after the war.

He was regarded as one of the outstanding Liberal M.P.s from Ontario. The government made him Chief Ontario Whip and it was regarded as a certainty that if he was elected next week he would be in line for a parliamentary assistantship.
