Mr. Murray Coles, a representative of the Gideons was the speaker at the Sunday morning service of Ballinafad church. Mr. Coles' scripture lesson was taken from the 119th Psalm, emphasizing verse 9, "Wherewithal shall a young man cleanse his way? by taking heed thereto according to thy word." 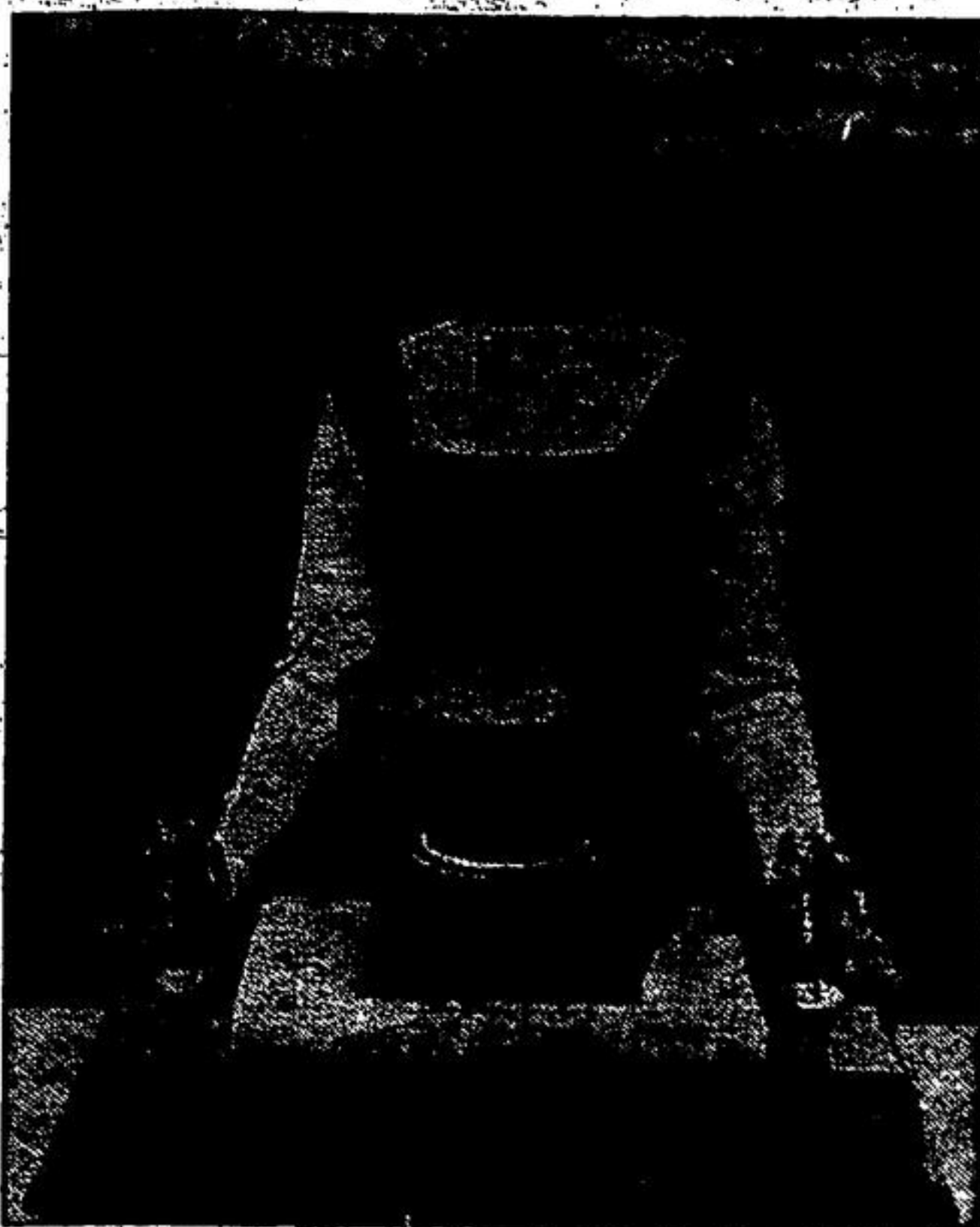
