COMPLETE PIPE ORGAN INSTALLATION IN CHURCH

Installation of a new pipe organ has been completed in St. George's Anglican Church. The new instrument is a two manual and pedal one, possessing over 1190 pipes. The console is of modern, functional design and blends with the present church furnishings.

A series of organ recitals has been scheduled for the month of June, to which residents of all religious denominations are invited. At Sunday evensong at 7:00 p.m., Rev. H. F. Thomasson, diocesan organist and choirmaster of the bishop's liturgical choir of Niagara Diocese will play a recital of sacred music.

Wednesday, June 12th, John Cook, organist of St. Paul's Cathedral, London will give a recital. Mr. Cook is an organ scholar of Christ Church College, Cambridge and has acted as conductor at the Old Vic Theatre in London, England. In 1940 he was appointed organist at the Collegiate Church of the Holy Trinity, Stratford-on-Avon. He came to Canada in 1954.

He has composed music for production at the Stratford Shakespearean Festival and has written music for organ and church choir, published by Novello. He is an associate of the Royal College of

Music, London and a fellow of the Royal College of Organists.

Dear Mr. Biehn:
What are you trying to do to Georgetown?

As a former Georgetown 'oldster' I must say I read with alarm, a few weeks ago, your article about the teen agers and the idea that they are cluttering up your streets. Is this not adverse publicity for your town when you are trying to entice new industry?

Then this week a criticism of your local magistrate for not upholding your police force. Have you taken the trouble to find out the exact duties of a magistrate? Not to uphold the police but to uphold the law. A magistrate is one who neither upholding the accuser or the accused, hands down a fair and impartial decision, after weighing carefully all the evidence submitted. Now! If the evidence is inconclusive, how can he uphold a police officer? If, as some of you say, the decisions are ridiculous, are not also some of the charges? A man of the calibre of your local magistrate is not going to convict every teenager who comes into his court where proper evidence is lacking. Are you all sitting on your complacent bottoms, secure in the knowledge that because you are council members your own youngsters could tear the town apart? — not caring what happens to the rest of the population.

Why not, while you are in the throes of trying to turn your future citizens into criminals and criticizing a magistrate of unimpeachable character, give your police department a little thought.

Georgetown has always been a good place to live and the youngsters are no better or worse than they ever were. Why not make the town interesting for them, and don't forget . . .
