TOWNSHIP SHOULD WORRY HAS NO FIRE AGREEMENT

Status of firefighting called in the Esquimaux Township area serviced by Georgetown fire department is confused at present.

At council meeting Monday, Deputy Reeve Doug Sargent said that no new agreement has been made with the township which at present owns its own truck and pays a retaining fee and a fee per call to the town.

"The township should be worried," said the deputy reeve "for the present agreement expires on July 1st."

Action and Milton, he requested are asking for a boost in fee to \$1,000 plus \$100 per call for the fire areas they serve.

Final approval was given for parking meters with passing of the by-law, and the meters will soon make their appearance in downtown Georgetown.

Council split on the question of allowing Bradshaw Flowers and Hunter Real Estate to install signs in front of their highway property which would be partly on town property.

Deputy Reeve Sargent said he could not approve when the building inspector had last year said other highway businesses to remove signs from town property.

Cr. Harrison objected to allowing the signs. Already, the property owner has been allowed concessions, he said. The building fronts on Normandy, yet the entrance doors are on the highway. It is supposedly an attachment to a Normandy Blvd. house, but it is only attached with a piece of plywood. Cr. Harrison remarked, Crs. Sykes and Hale sided with the two to defeat the motion, despite the plea of Cr. Hyde that the signs would be in line with other existing highway signs and would do town property no harm.

Installation of a storm sewer on Guelph St. to clear up poor drainage in front of Georgetown Animal Clinic will proceed immediately. Estimated cost is \$2500.

Asked by Bernard Cassell about promised action to eliminate muddy patches between the road and property lines in the Sunbeam area, road chairman Walter Gray said this had been delegated pending suitable weather conditions and it would proceed as soon as possible.

Rex Cock asked if council would consider sodding a town-owned property in Clarendon subdivision if residents provided labour and maintenance. His request was turned over to the property committee. Asking if a backstop could be installed for a proposed ball diamond in the Harrison schoolyard, Wilfrid Boisbois was referred to the school board.

Riotous Dairy Float, Pipe Band, Aid Lions Peterborough Rally

Georgetown Lions made a good impression with their entry in the District A convention parade in Peterborough last Sunday as anyone who viewed last year's Christmas parade can well understand. The float borrowed the winning Provincial Paper Mill float, impersonating the local dairies, including horse, wagon, cow, egg-laying ostrich and three or four milkmen clowns.

The Georgetown Girls Pipe Band led the local contingent which included 25 Lions. Approximately 25 bands and corresponding floats made up the parade which drew Lions Clubs for all over Ontario and Quebec. Almost 45,000 people lined the parade route on Sunday, the initial day for the four day assembly. Two of the Georgetown Lions, some chairman Jack McGinnis and first vice president Dick Kishall stayed for the conferences, most of the members, returning home Sunday night.

Barn Landmark Razed In Spectacular Fire

One of the largest barns in the district burned to the ground Friday night in a spectacular fire that firemen battled until early Saturday morning. The blaze travelled through the old building like it was so much matchwood and by the time the firemen arrived had too much of a hold to be brought under control.

The barn, part of the McCullough Estate at the western limits of town on No. 7 Highway was built in 1884 but had not been used for the housing of cattle since the death of Dr. H. A. McCullough almost one year ago. A threshing machine and a corn binder stored in the barn by Sam Mileham, R. R. 3, Georgetown, were destroyed in the blaze.

The alarm was turned in by Bruce Lindsay at approximately 8:25 but even then the building was a mass of flames and smoke. Mr. Lindsay owns the farm opposite the McCullough estate. A new Canadian residing in the old McCullough farm house was at first unaware of the outbreak due to a shed situated directly between the house and the barn which apparently blocked the view.

A large crowd of onlookers watched the fire which at its height could be seen for five miles around. Once below the foundation the firemen let the flames go. Charred timbers were still smoldering early Monday morning. The cause of the blaze was not determined.
