Expect 875 Enrolment in North Halton High Schools

High school attendance in the three schools operated under North Halton school board is estimated at 875 for the next term, according to statistics compiled recently by the board.

Schools in Georgetown, Acton and Milton had been operated under the one school board for several years, with members appointed from five municipalities, the three towns and Esquesing and Nassagaweya townships.

Three teachers are leaving: the Georgetown staff in June, and replacements have been engaged for them.

There are also several changes in the other towns.

Principal C. A. Wood is leaving Milton for a new position in Oakville and Mr. A. Meddings, Alliston takes over his job in September. Science teacher John Lee goes to Sutton and is replaced by Jan Baker, a Dutch-Canadian from London.

Math teacher John Sullivan is replaced by J. E. Marcellus, who was principal of the school when he retired. W. H. Brown, shop teacher goes to South Peel for a full-time shop position and Ross Gossling takes over at Milton. Miss Blanche Gillespie and Miss Valerie Evans, experienced teachers from England, are additions to Milton staff.

At Acton Miss Jessie Galloway replaces Mr. W. Wilhelm as commercial teacher. Tom Campbell, who is a brother of Mrs. Joe Dwyer of town, replaces Carl Piellusch, in the Science department. Mr. O. Drijber is going to Fergus and Mr. E. Evans, Guelph will succeed him.

FARM NEWS

Pasture Management Stressed By Speaker

"We fall down more on pasture management than we do on our mixtures," stated Professor R. S. Fulkerson of the Department of Field Husbandry, OAC, when addressing the Halton Farm Management Association in Milton on Wednesday evening of last week.

Birdfoot Trefoil definitely has a place in Ontario agriculture but don't get the idea that it will ever replace alfalfa in our hay and pasture mixtures, was another of his comments. The place for Birdfoot Trefoil is on some of our poorer soils where due to high acidity or poor drainage, alfalfa does not prosper. September is the month to make your fertilizer applications on pastures and it is also the time when, if possible, grazing should be restricted in order to give the roots an opportunity to store up the necessary plant food. Close pasturing in October is not harmful, aside from the fact that a reasonable amount of top helps to hold the snow as protection during the winter months.
