### APPOINT RALPH HANSEN SCHOOL BOARD MEMBER

### BAKERY, MEAT PLANT, TV STATION ON W.I. TOUR

On Thursday morning, June 6th, thirty-four Institute members went on a bus trip to Kitchener. The first stop was the Schneider's meat plant where guides showed the ladies around and said they have one thousand employees. They saw the weighing and shipping room, also refrigerator room, the packing of lard and all the different processing of meats from the time it is killed until it is sold. A light lunch of sliced cooked meat, bread and butter was served. The group next toured the city and had an hour's shopping, visited the memorial gardens and the arena and from there toured the Weston's bakery and saw bread being made. They make 2880 loaves an hour; saw jam tarts baking in the huge ovens and ladies icing layer cakes. They buy supplies by the car-load and everything is tested and must be up to

standard. Then they visited CKCR TV station and sat in on the program "Come into the kitchen" and some of the ladies won prizes on the "lucky draws." Mrs. Violet Scriver explained how the programs are put on and conducted a tour of the station. After stopping for six o'clock dinner at the Smorgasbord everyone arrived home safely, but a bit tired. 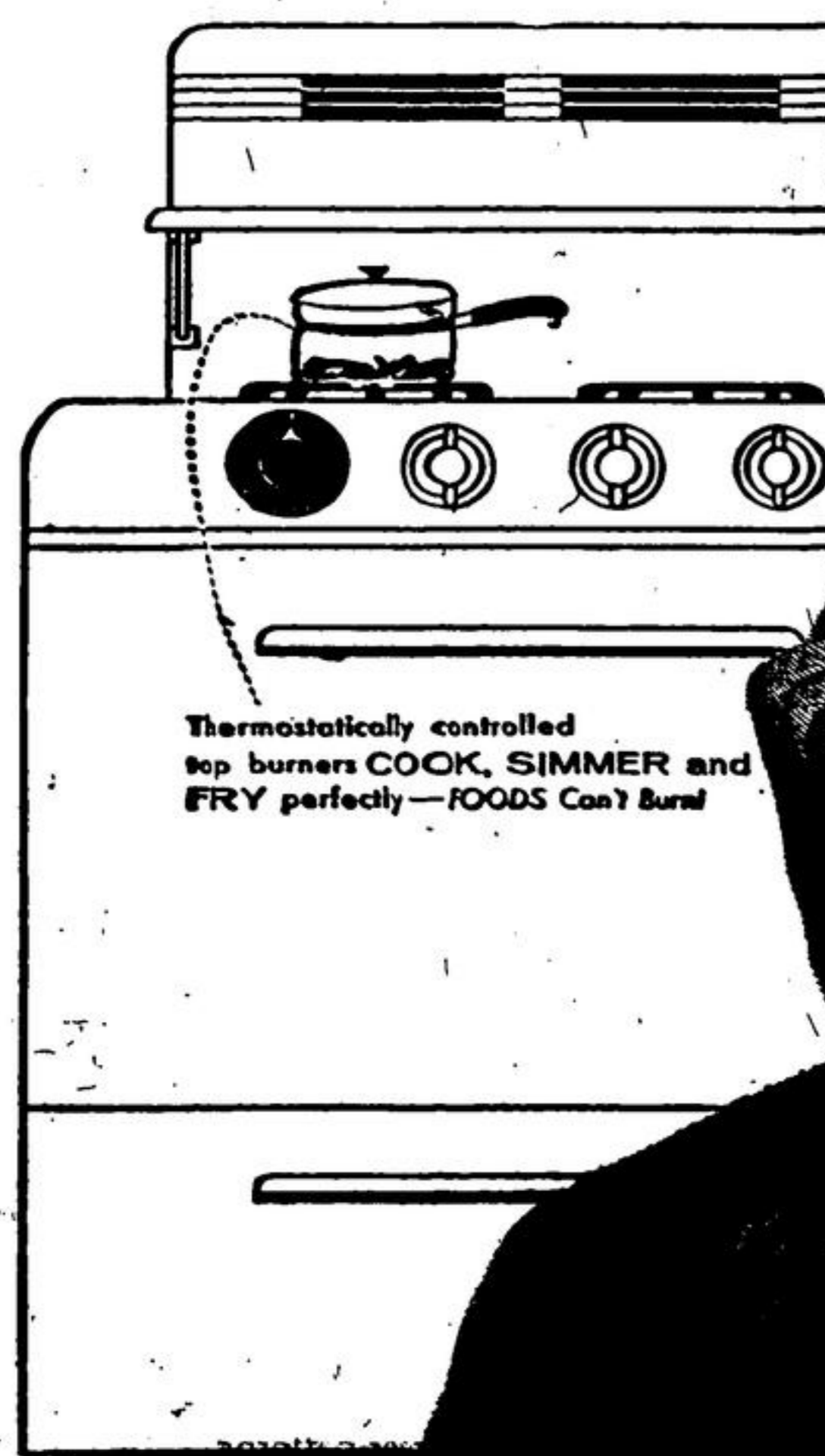

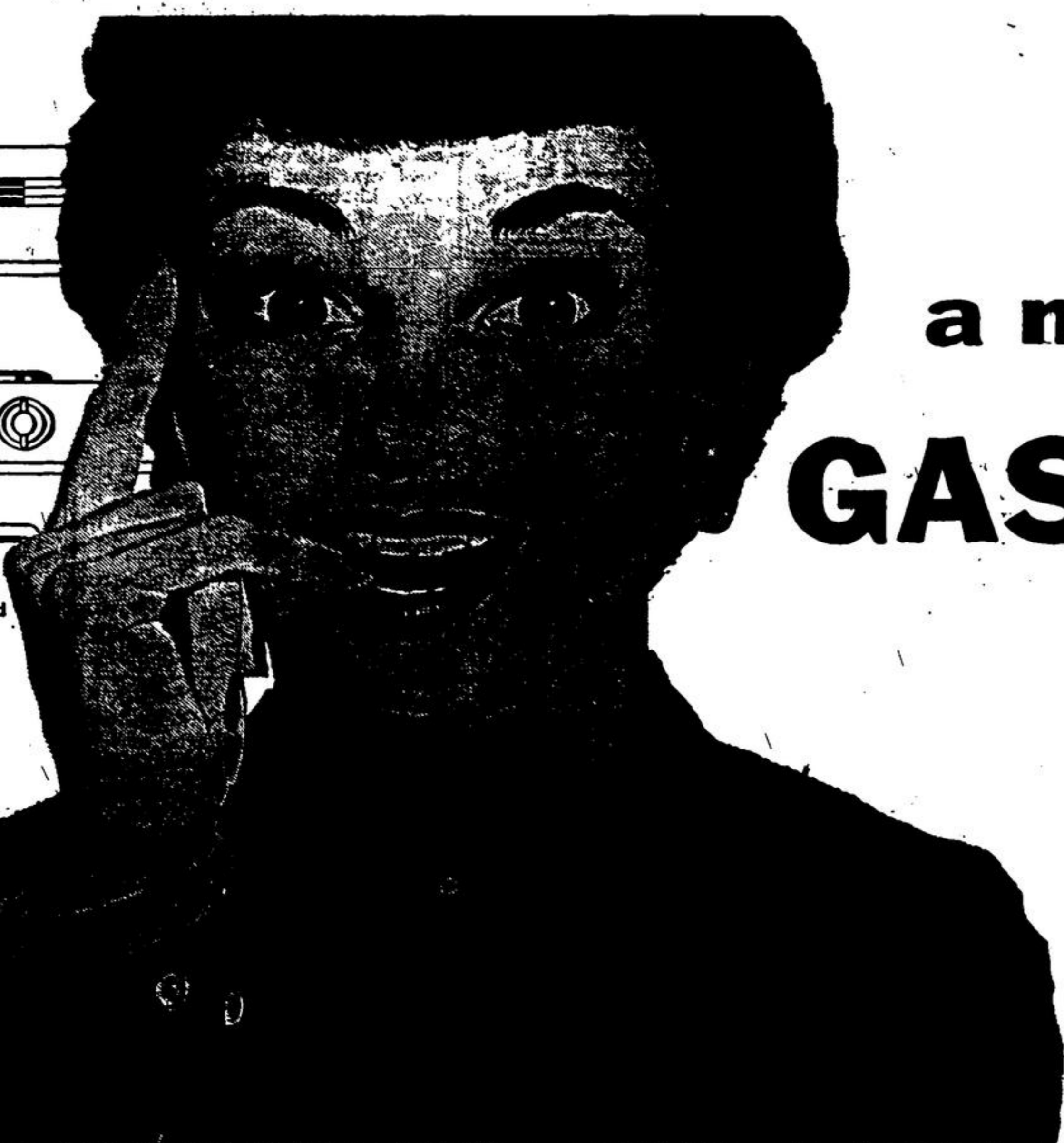
