Leafy Spurge

Leafy Spurge is a pernicious, perennial weed which came to the continent from Europe. Odd patch es have been found on roadsides in Halton. While 2, 4-D and Brushkill will keep it under control, our experience would indicate that neithere one will eradicate it.

Work in Peel county over the past several years would indicate that for odd patches, D. B. Granular is the most effective herbicide tried to date.

A number of demonstrations with the material have been laid down in Halton this year --- so a year from now we hope to know more about it. We would urge our readers to be on guard against this deep rooted perennial - the stack of which contains a milky juice. The Bowers are greenish yellow, in umbel-like clusters with a ring of leaf-like bracts at the base of
