He congratulated the congregation on the installation of the new pipe organ.

During the service a magnificent superfrontal, the gift of the Woman's Auxiliary, was dedicated in memory of Archdeacon W. G. O. Thompson, rector of the parish from 1832 to 1864. It is of silk damask and has the rose of England embroidered at four points, symbolic of the four gospels. In the centre is a gold cross, a visible reminder of Christ's victory over death.

The rector, Rev. Kenneth Richardson, congratulated the Daughters of the Church during the service on their response to the pipe organ fund with a donation of twenty pipes for the new instrument.

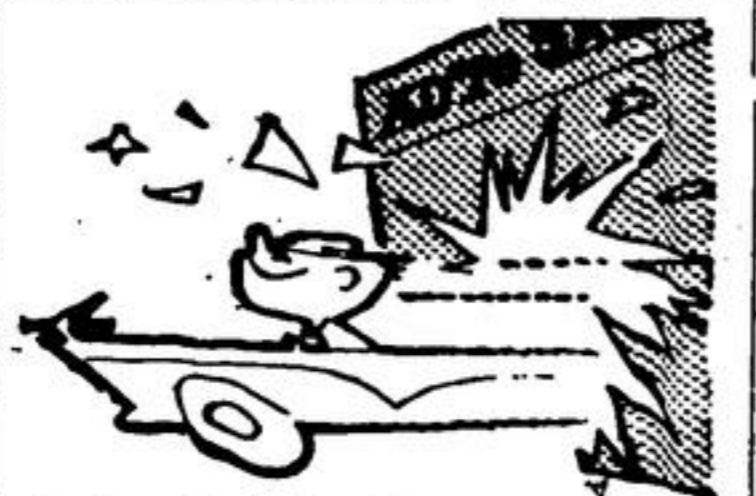
