**FASCINATING STORY OF STEEP ROCK DISCOVERY**

Mining might be thought of as an uninteresting subject to most women, but Mrs. Shier's paper on the tremendous part mining plays in Canada, and in particular on the discovery and development of what may be history's richest from

range, was an enthralling story. From the search of a lone prospector in 1890, through the trackless wilderness of the Lakehead district of Northern Ontario, right through to the rolling down to Lake Superior to the richest iron ore in North America, from Steep Rock mine in 1945, proves, in the prospector's own words "If you have faith and knowledge you can do almost anything." The ore was found beneath Steep Rock Lake, which meant draining the lake to scoop out ore from the dry-lake bottom, damming up and reversing the flow of Marmion Lake which emptied into Steep Rock, into nearby Finlayson Lake which in turn had to be channelled 53 feet deeper than it was to receive the flow.

The total investment in Steep Rock was eventually more than 50 million dollars, which certainly reflected faith in Canada's resources, but it is agreed by government and business leaders, as well as educators, that Canada's future expansion hinges on exploiting the full potential of her young people. What youngsters now at school decide to make of their lives will be vitally important not only to Canada but to the world.

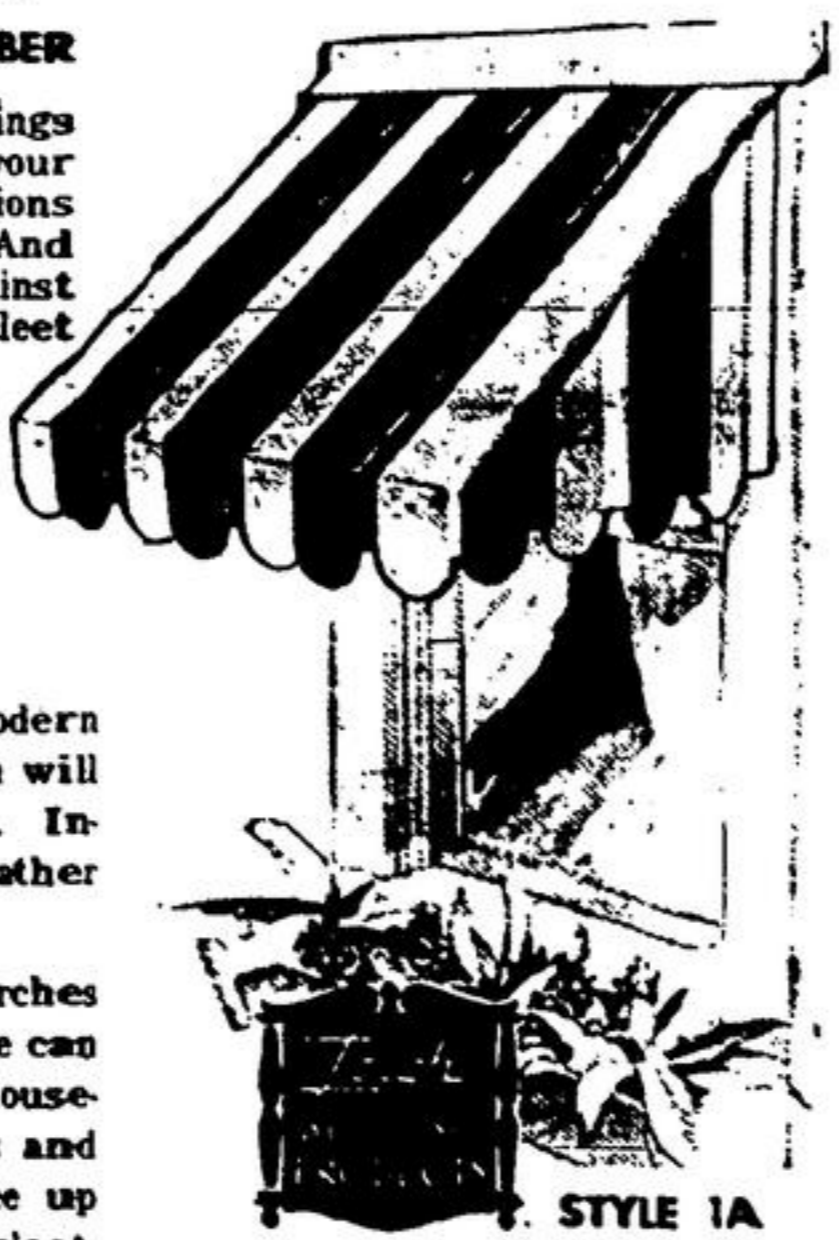

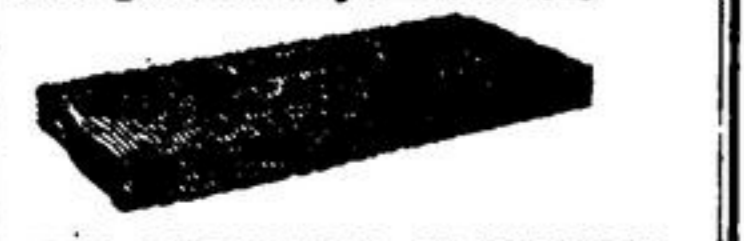
