Organist Gordon Jeffery Recital At St. Géorge's

Final of a series of three recitals to introduce the new pipe organ in St. George's Anglican Church is planned tonight, when Gordon Jeffery, president of the will be the visiting artist.

Mr. Jeffery, a native of London, began his organ training with Dr. Charles Poaker, Toronto while attending law school at Osgoode Hall and later studied under Ernest White in New York. He is conductor of the London Chamber Orchestra and founder of the Bach Festival which for nine years has attracted visitors from a wide area for a week-end series of concerts.

Last Wednesday's concert was played by Catharine Palmer, or ganist at Holy Trinity Church, Toronto, who trained at the Royal Academy of Music in England, won the Turpin Prize and was the first Canadian woman to obtain her fellowship at the college.

The previous week, John Cook, organist at St. Paul's Cathedral, ondon presented the first recital. Mr. Cook has composed music for production at the Stratford Shakespearian Fastival and has written positions, Allegro Giocoso. -

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
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
