**TOWN SOLICITOR CLAIMS
LAW SUIT LUDICROUS**
A ludicrous law suit was the terminology used by town solicitor John Ord at a recent council meeting, when he reported on a complicated situation arising from the building of Swanek subdivision.

Last year the town entered suit against subdivider Finlay Munro, claiming he was responsible for installing storm sewers, badly needed to alleviate poor drainage in the subdivision. In April council decided to drop the suit, fearing litigation costs would be excessive to recover an estimated \$11,000 needed for sewers. Mr. Munro had already entered a counter claim, and council's decision was to drop the suit, providing no costs would be payable to Mr. Munro and that he would drop his own suit.

A counter claim for \$50,000 has been entered by Mr. Munro against the town and Mayor Armstrong for installing watermains and sanitary sewers, and Mr. Ord reported to council that J. J. Robinson, Toronto, has been retained to handle procedure for the town.

The claim, he said, is based on a letter written by Mayor Armstrong in May, 1953, together with one written by the Smith & Stone company, indicating the need for housing in Georgetown at that time, and pointing out that it was own policy to instal sewers and watermains. The land at that time was owned by the late Thos. Hewson.

Mr. Ord reported that Mr. Munro is claiming that years later, when he was subdividing after purchasing the land, he had not known of the town's change of policy.

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
