

Truck Air Brakes Fail Five-Vehicle Collision

A bruised neck was the only injury resulting from a five-car pile up at the intersection of Guelph and water streets early Tuesday evening, July 2nd. Taken to the office of Dr. A. E. Macintosh for treatment was Mrs. G. A. Foster, 4 Cliffside Dr., Toronto, a passenger in one of the cars.

Clear thinking on the part of a transport driver, George English, of Lane's Haulage, kept the accident from being fatal. He was proceeding east down the Guelph St. hill at about 5:30 p.m. when two preceding cars driven by George H. Leslie, R.R. 4 Georgetown, and George Foster, Toronto, came to a stop at the caution light as the Leslie car waited to make a left turn into John St.

When he found the air brakes failing to hold the heavy truck Mr. English sounded the horn while approaching the intersection as a warning to the other cars, and veered to the left in an attempt to miss the standing vehicles. Despite this action the big truck caught the left rear side of the Foster car driving it ahead into the Leslie vehicle and on down the highway for another 40 feet. The impact shot the Leslie car across the road where it bounced off a parked car on the Herkes & Raycroft lot into a truck owned by Donald Manery, 1151 St. Clair Ave., Toronto, a distance of about 100 feet. The Lane truck finally came to a halt opposite the Georgetown Creamery.

The damage to the five vehicles involved amounted to over \$1,000. Cst. Ted Scott investigated the accident.
