Pollution Control Program Being Formulated in Ontario

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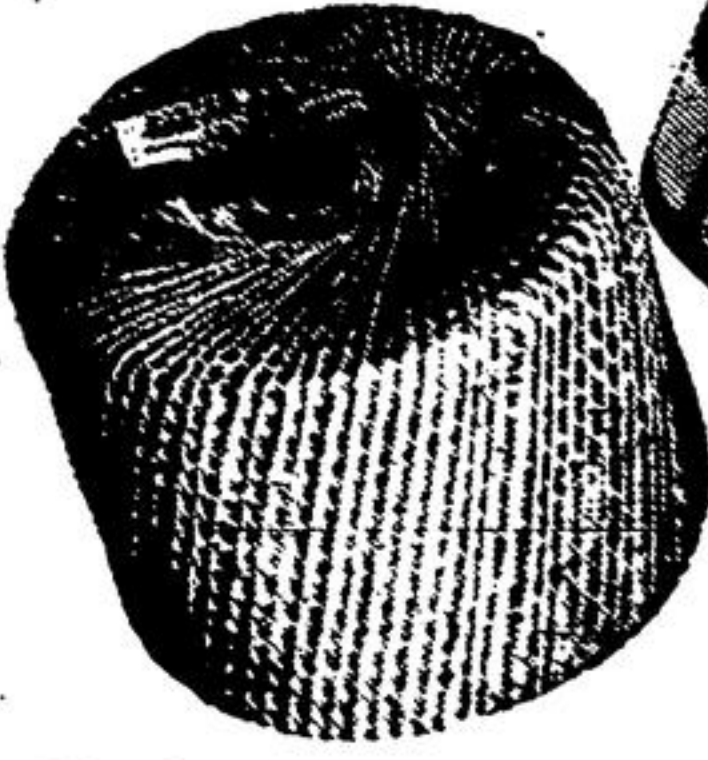
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Acton Funeral For M. Varey, Limehouse

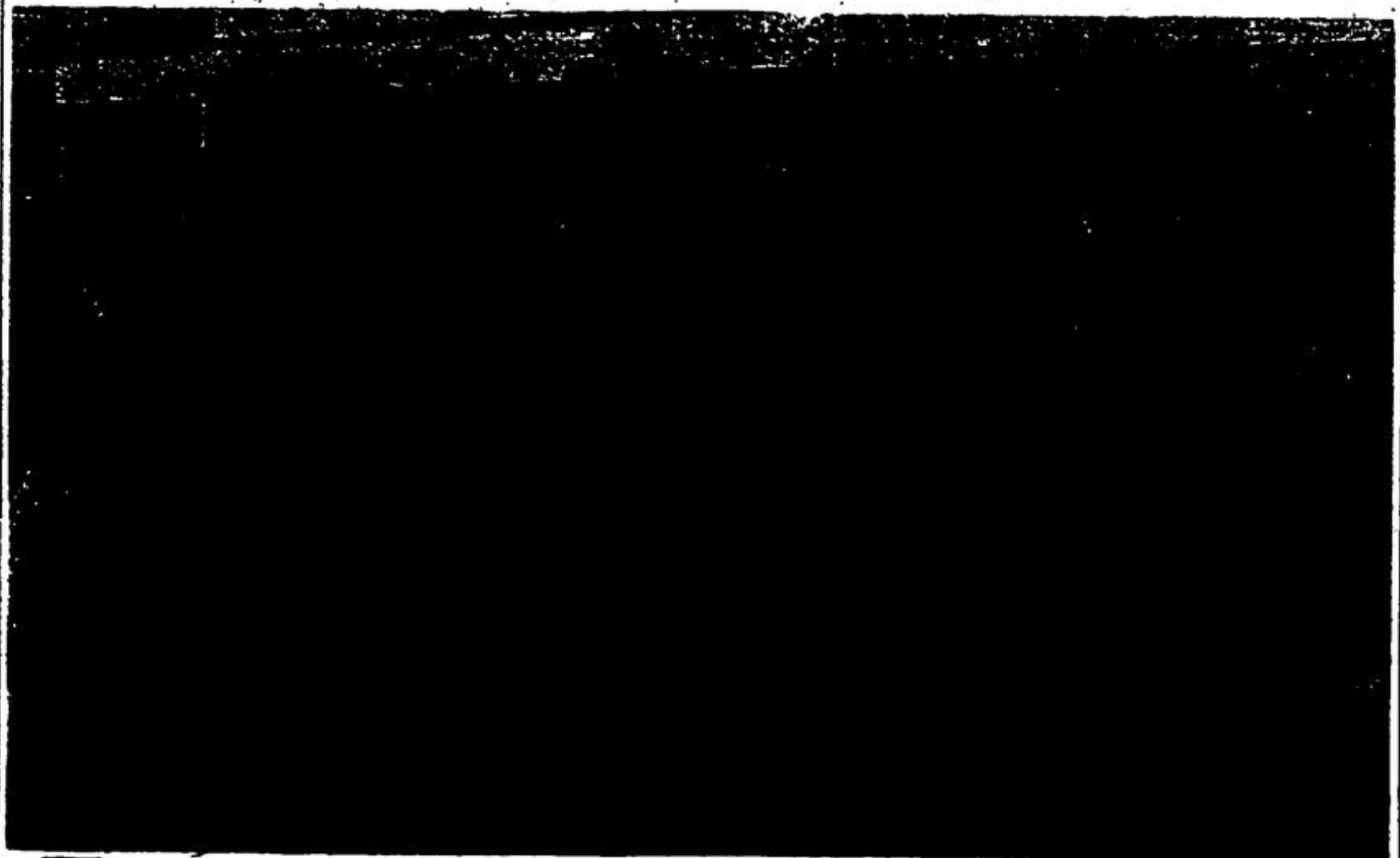

Funeral service was held from the Rumley Funeral Home, June 29th. Rev. Evan Jones officiated. Interment was in Fairview Cemetery. A. M. Snider, of Waterloo, chairman of the Ontario Water Resources Commission, said a comprehensive program for controlling water pollution throughout the province is now underway. Following a meeting of the commission, Mr. Snider said that legislation, approved by the Ontario Legislature at the spring session, authorized the Commission to undertake such a program. The object is to ensure clean streams, and water courses and make these waters available for all normal uses.

domestic water supplies, industrial uses, fish and wildlife and recreation. The commission chairman said a good start already has been made on the program and outlined some of its procedures. "Construction of new sewage treatment plants and extension of existing plants are necessary," he said. "Those will be built either by the Commission or the municipalities themselves."

Mr. Snider said that to carry out such a program of water pollution control, the Water Resources Commission has developed a staff of experienced experts recruited from the field of sanitation. A new, modern laboratory for research and testing purpose was planned for the northwest section of Metropolitan Toronto, while a new laboratory had been put into operation in Sarnia recently. "We ask the cooperation of industry, municipalities and all interested persons in such a major undertaking," Mr. Snider said. "It will cost money, but the ultimate benefits will far outweigh the total cost."

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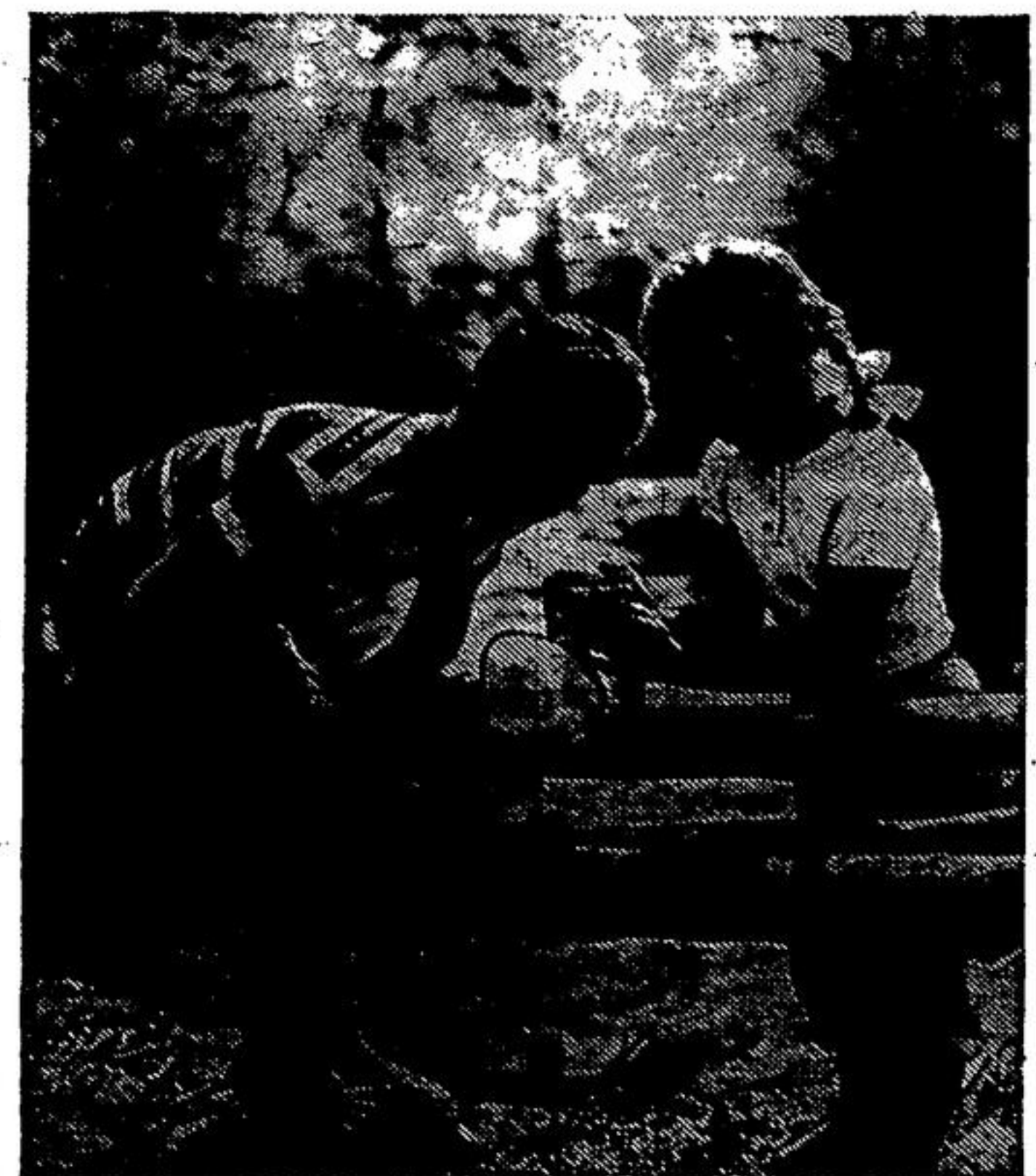
