Fred Harrison but was overruled by other councillors who decided to ask the Ontario Municipal Improvement Cor-

poration to buy the debenture, A similar request will be made to OMIC to purchase an \$11,000 debenture for the Swanek storm sewer. Cr. Hyde was the lone opponent when this was voted upon.

Cr. Hyde emphasized that he was not against the projects, but that he feels the town is in a position where if small improvements cannot be paid for currently, they should not be added to a growing debenture debt which will cost the town half as much again to pay back.
