A month ago the county council decided that it would be agreeable to an open season providing neighbouring counties of Peel, Wellington and Wentworth also held open seasons. A letter was sent asking for opinions from these county councils.

To date, Wentworth has said it will approve if its neighbours do; Wellington is opposed; Peel has made no reply.

The matter has been turned over to the Chief Wildlife Ranger of the Lands and Forests Dept. for a decision.

### GUNS NEVER KILL "IDEAS" SAYS NEWS ANALYST

Lisa Sergio, a foremost U.S. lecturer on world affairs, warns all war-mongers that guns can kill only men, not the ideas these men have. The celebrated news analyst, who will appear here on Sept. 24th in Knox Hall under the auspices of the Georgetown Business & Professional Women's Club, is firm in her belief that ideas can only be altered or wiped out of existence by actions that realistically disprove their alleged merits. The brilliant authority on world affairs believes that one of the best ways for young people, particularly public-spirited war veterans, to take an active part in helping the peoples of the world to understand each other better, is to enter the profession of politics, journalism or diplomacy. Miss Sergio says that politics, often defined as a game, is actually the science of government, and that too few individuals who go into politics view it that way.

"Those politicians everywhere in the world who have made an ugly stain on the whole idea of politics with their own bad record of dishonesty, would not have had a chance to do so if more people had chosen politics as a profession and trained for it in time, viewing it as a science and not as a game. The same goes for diplomacy," she says.
