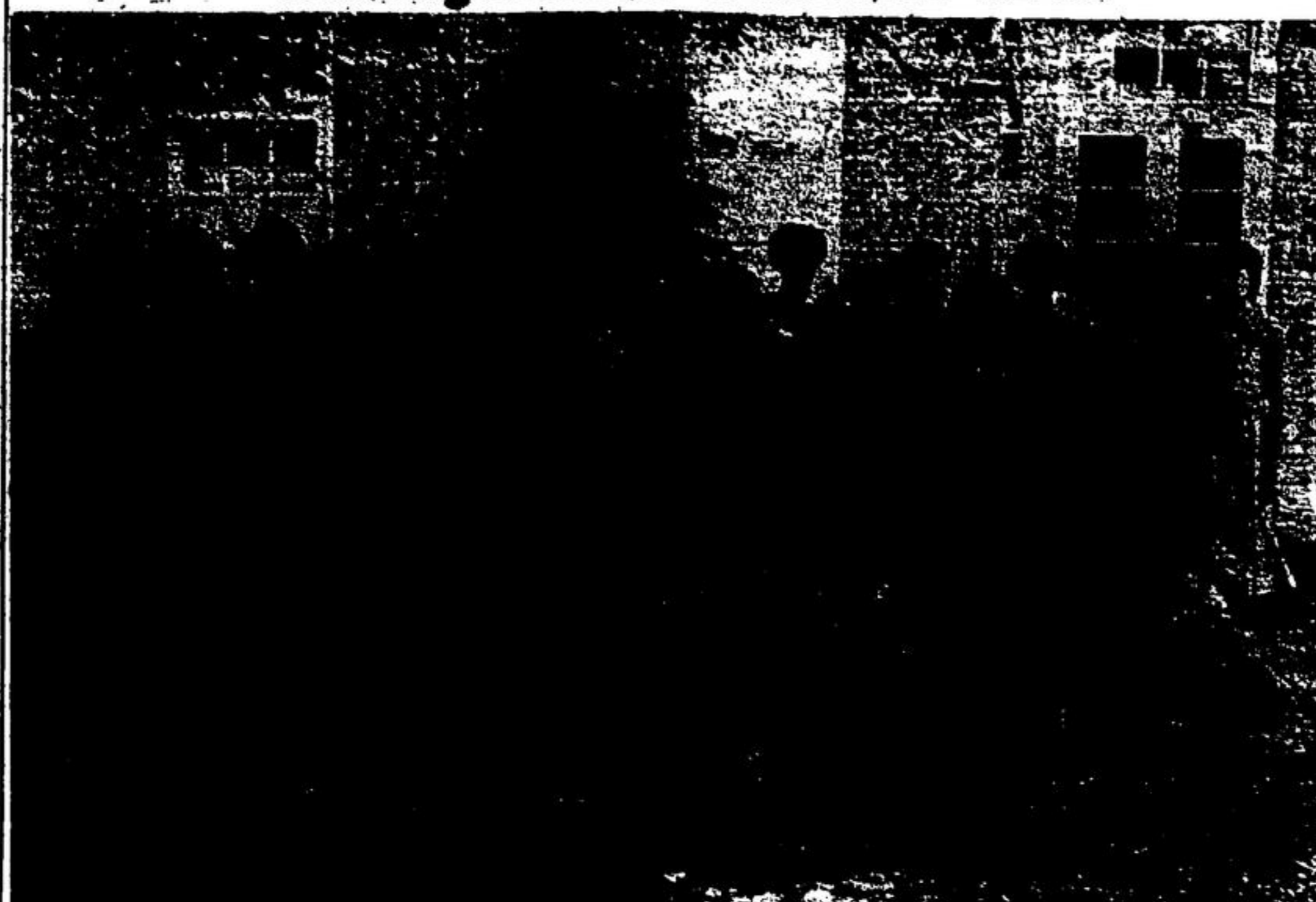

Prominent in County William Deans Dies

Prominent in Halton County which he had served as clerk for twenty years, William Deans, 68 was buried in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown following funeral service last Wednesday at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home. Mr. Deans died at his home, 33 Edith St. on July 8th.

In addition to his duties as clerk of the county, Mr. Deans was secretary-treasurer of Halton Children's Aid Society and secretary of the board of management of Halton Centennial Manor. He was also a justice of the peace.

He was a faithful member of St. John's United Church where he had served as treasurer for many years, retiring from the post two years ago. He was an elder in the church, and a former treasurer of the Sunday school. He belonged to Credit Masonic Lodge. Mr. Deans was born in Stonehaven, Scotland. He and his wife, Margaret Shewan came to Canada in 1911. He was employed with the Bank of Hamilton, later the Bank of Commerce in Hamilton, Dunnville, Listowel, Fordwich, Orangeville and Georgetown, to which the family came in 1927.

Mrs. Deans died in 1955. He leaves three children, Constance (Mrs. R. G. Maitland) and Mae (Mrs. W. A. Beam) of Toronto, and Frances, a member of the local post office staff; three grandchildren, Janet Maitland, Nancy and Donald Beam; a brother Ronald Deans in London, England, and two sisters, Miss Maisie Deans, Bervie, Scotland and Mrs. John McCall, Lanark, Scotland.

Rev. Morgan McFarlane conducted the funeral service. Pallbearers were Garfield Brown, Ford Rogers and Frank Thompson, Milton, Reeve Stan Allen, E. B. Swackhamer and Jack Williamson, Georgetown.

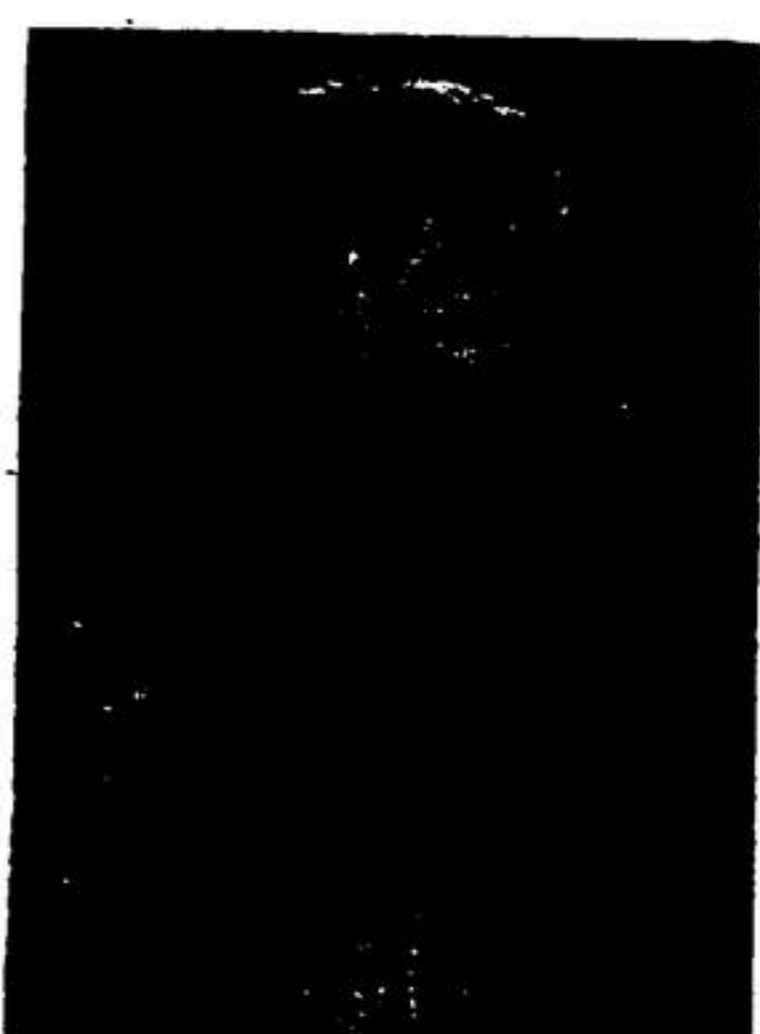
