## ABC Reflection Sovereign, Great Holstein Sire Dies

One of the great sires of the Holstein breed in Canada is dead at the age of ten years. He is ABC Reflection Sovereign who has been one of the leading sires of prize winning progeny at major Canadian shows of the past few years. He and his progeny have also included the top shows of the USA adding lustre to his name and that of Canadian Holsteins by their winnings.

ABC Reflection Sovereign was bred by Armstrong Bros. of Brampton and was transferred along with the farm and the rest of the herd when it was bought in 1948 by Dr. Victor I. Astesaga, who since that time has spent part of each year in his native Argentina and part at Brampton.

ABC Reflection Sovereign has been officially classified extra by the Holstein-Friesian Association of Canada, this being the highest rating that a Canadian bull can win. The award is based on the superior quality of his daughters both for body conformation and production. He is himself excellent for type, the highest standard attainable for conformation and has three times won All-Canadian honours in the showring.


However, it is on the outstanding show ring lines of his progeny that his great reputation rests. For three straight years, 1953, 1954 and 1955, his daughters were named All-Canadian and All-American Get of Sire, after winning first prize in those classes at the Royal Winter Fair in Toronto and at the International Dairy Show in Chicago for Mr. Astesaga.

Probably his most noted daughter is ABC Shamrock Mildred who was selected as All-American and All-Canadian four year old heifer in 1953 after being named Grand Champion at the International Dairy Show in Chicago. Mildred was also chosen as All-American aged cow in 1954, when she repeated her feat of winning the Chicago Grand Championship and All-Canadian aged cow in 1955 after taking the COWS Grand Championship.

In 1956 and almost equally famous was ABC Reflection Sovereign's daughter, ABC Reflection Sunshine who made Grand Champion at the Royal Winter Fair for Mr. Bay Ginnings, Brantford, Ontario, while still a yearling. Sunshine was selected as Reserve Grand Champion. Sunshine was then chosen as All-Canadian three year old and sold at the top market price of \$4,200 at the Ontario Dairy Show in Toronto.
