SOCIAL SERVICE SECRETARY GUEST IN ST. JOHN'S PULPIT

ESTABLISH MEMORIAL FUND FOR BILL McCUTCHEN

As a result of injuries incurred while attending a farm sale, Bill McCutchen, prominent member of the Dufferin County Junior Farmers Association in Ontario, died recently. Bill had compiled an outstanding record in 4-H and Junior Farmers work and, in tribute to the high esteem in which he was held in his community, a group of friends has established a fund to be known as the Bill McCutchen Memorial Fund.

Bill had completed 4-H projects in grain, swine, potato, calf and tractor maintenance. Over the years he had filled all offices in the various clubs, had attended district camps and was active in athletics. His enthusiastic participation and leadership in all junior activities will be sadly missed.

The McCutchen family is widely known throughout the county. Bill's mother is President of the district Women's Institutes and his father is past president of the County Federation of Agriculture. His older brother Don has been working as a fieldman for the Ontario Department of Agriculture and is a director of the Provincial Junior Farmer Association.

The money collected through the memorial fund will be used for the promotion of Junior Farmer and 4-H Club Work in which Bill was so interested.

TWILIGHT MEETING AT JOHN MUTH FARM

The Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association will hold its annual twilight meeting at the farm of John Muth. Arrangements have been made to have Dr. D. N. Huntley, head of the Field Husbandry Department, as guest speaker. Dr. Huntley will discuss latest developments in Field Husbandry.

Row variety tests of oats, barley and oat-barley mixtures are located on the Muth farm. There will be a discussion of the different varieties at the meeting.

The twilight meeting will be held on Wednesday, July 31st, at 7.55 p.m. The Muth farm is located south of No. 5 sideroad, on the town line between Nelson and Trafalgar townships.

Summer Shorthorn Meeting Held at Aberfeldy Farms

Aberfeldy Farms, owned by R. Ford Gardhouse, Milton, was the locale of the Royal Shorthorn Club's annual summer event. This twilight function was held on Saturday evening July 6. The large turnout of Shorthorn adherents, with members of their families, was treated to an inspection of the Aberfeldy herd, took part in the judging competitions, type demonstration, weight guessing contest, moving picture display and presentation of prizes. The program was directed by Smith Griffin, the club's president.

Beautiful Aberfeldy Farm never looked better and many visitors, with an appreciation for horticulture as well as cattle, were seen inspecting the well landscaped and immaculately maintained gardens.

Three classes of animals were paraded for the judging, two of them bull classes. The official adjudicators were Prof. M. W. Staples of the Ontario Agricultural College and Messrs. R. C. Parker, Watford, and Maurice Baker, Georgetown, with H. R. White acting as M. C.

In addition to the judging classes, Prof. M. W. Staples classified one of the bulls in accordance with the requirements of the Canadian Shorthorn Association's official score card. The audience were provided with score cards and asked to undertake the classification for comparison with the official result. The uniformity in the scoring was remarkably even and this fact was commented upon by Prof. Staples, who said this fact added credence to the efficiency of the Canadian Shorthorn score card system.

A highlight of the evening was the parading of the Junior Aberfeldy herd sire, only recently arrived from Scotland. This bull, Kinnellar Novelist, is a son of the bull, Gallant Marshall, that sired so many top priced animals at Perth in 1956. This good headed, heavy boned, smooth fleshed, 18-month-old bull found favour with the crowd and was very favorably received. He is a young bull that displayed a combination of good body conformation detail, along with strength and ruggedness.

The winners of the prizes offered by the Ontario Shorthorn Club were Angus Muir, Mono Centre (best adult male judge); Mrs. A. Agnew, Milton, weight guessing contest. It was a great night for the family of Earl Gregor, Guelph. Mrs. Gregor won the ladies, judging competition, and the son and daughters were tops in the junior judging competition for boys and girls under 20 years.

Many members of the Simcoe County Club were in attendance and visitors were present from other neighboring clubs as far away as Durham county to the east and Lambton county in the west.

The meeting was closed at 11.30 p.m. in the spacious sale pavilion, where a bountiful lunch was served after the conclusion of the presentation of the prizes and a Shorthorn moving picture display.

Mr. Greenwood was born in England and has lived in the Hamilton and Niagara districts since early childhood. He was a resident of Fruitland for 20 years. In 1934 he joined the Federal Department of Agriculture as a fruit and vegetable inspector.

During the war years, he worked for Victory Aircraft at Malton, returning to the department in 1945. In 1947, Mr. Greenwood joined the Ontario Department of Ag-

riculture in a similar capacity and was promoted to supervising inspector for the Niagara district in 1951. He came to Peel and Halton counties in 1954.

Before assuming his new post, Mr. Greenwood completed a one-month course at Queen's Park. He will work out of the Peel county probation office at Brampton until such time as renovations are completed on the old Registry Office at Milton and his office is provided there.

Mr. Greenwood's duties will cover cases from Magistrate's Court, Family Court and Juvenile Court.
