Saturday, August 3rd was chosen as her wedding day by Jacqueline Beverley Cohen, a member of the teaching staff of Vaughan Road Collegiate, Toronto who was married in St. Peter's Anglican Church, Erindale at 2:30 p.m. to Robert Charles Sanderson.

Mr. Sanderson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cecil G. (Sandy) Sanderson, Hamilton is employed in the computing department of the A. V. Roe Co., Malton. His bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William James Cohen, Limehouse.

Canon G. F. Banks officiated, and the church was decorated with white gladioli. William Boucher was organist and Mrs. J. Boon sang "The Lord's Prayer" before the service and "O Perfect Love" during the signing of the register. Mr. Sanderson is a graduate of McMaster University and his bride of the University of Toronto.

The bride wore white mirror mist, her gown having an empire waistline, a portrait neckline outlined with flowers of sequins and seed pearls and long lily-point sleeves. The gown had a slim panel in front on princess lines with fullness at the hip dipping into a "u" at the back. It had a chapel train. A tulle illusion fingertip veil was held by a coronet of best and pearl petals with sequin backing in flower design. She carried a white orchid on a white prayer book with streamers of Larspur.

The bride's sister, Mrs. William Bruce McCallum, Burnhamthorpe, was matron of honour; Misses Leslie Ann Newman, Toronto and Nancy Watson Gibb, Port Credit were bridesmaids. The building was located on Guelph St., in the approximate location of the present J. J. Gibbens house.

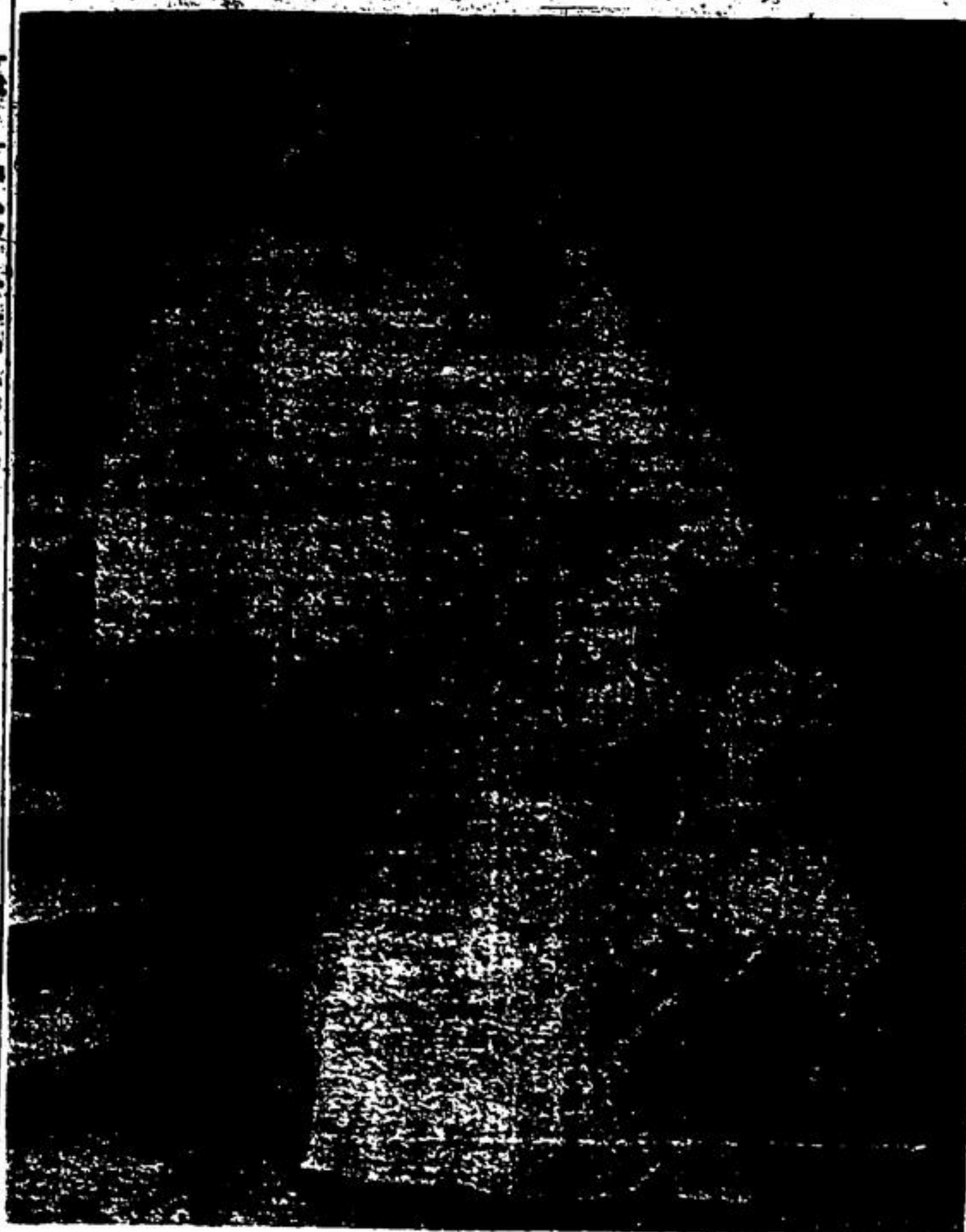
Perhaps one of Georgetown's senior residents may recall some details of the business.

MINOR DAMAGE AS CARS COLLIDE

The damage was confined to the left side of the King car, a 1953 Dodge and the left front fender and side of the '36 Plymouth driven by Mr. Jackson. The mishap was investigated by Cst. Nels Trafford.

Serious Injuries for Brisbois Family, Norval Head-on Crash

APPOINT JOHN MORRISON MILL MANAGER, FT. WILLIAM

John C. Morrison, formerly assistant manager of the Fort William mill of Abitibi Power & Paper Company Limited, has been appointed manager to succeed J. T. Carey, who retires after 23 years' service with the company. Announcement of Mr. Morrison's promotion was made by E. W. McBride, manager of Abitibi Mills, which also controls the local Provincial Paper Ltd. mill.

Mr. Morrison is a native of Vancouver, B.C., where he attended school. He graduated from the University of British Columbia with the B.Sc. degree (honours in chemistry). He started his career with the pulp and paper industry in 1938 as assistant plant chemist with the British Columbia Pulp and Paper Company, Port Alice, B.C. He joined Abitibi in March 1948 as senior chemist, Central Research Laboratory, Sault Ste. Marie. In January 1951, he became assistant to the mill manager at Sault Ste. Marie and, in 1953, was named assistant mill manager in the same division. Mr. Morrison discharged those functions until his appointment as assistant mill manager of the Fort William mill.
