Harry Ferry Former Legion Steward, Veteran Two Wars

Veteran of two wars, and a former steward at Branch 120, Canadian Legion, Harry (Harry) Ferry, 65 was buried in Brampton cemetery on Friday.

Mr. Ferry died at his home, 120 Main St. N., Brampton, on July 31st as the result of a heart attack. His health had not been good for several years and he had frequently been a patient in hospital, although recently he had been feeling much better. Mr. and Mrs. Ferry had just returned to Brampton from a pleasant six weeks' vacation at Washago.

Son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Robert Ferry, he was born in Sunderland, England. With his wife, the former Dorothy Ann Jackson, he came to Canada in 1929. They lived at Clarkson, then moved to Georgetown in 1922.

Mr. Ferry was wounded twice and was once posted as missing while serving in France in the First War with the Durham Light Infantry. When World War II broke out he was one of the first local men to enlist, and went overseas in 1940 with the Lorne Scots, serving until his discharge in 1943. Since then he had lived in Georgetown, Washago and Brampton. He was a member of the local Legion branch.

Surviving are his wife, a daughter Nancy, Mrs. Gordon Copeland, Brampton and a son George H. of Washago; four grandchildren, Sheila and Jeanette Copeland, James Henry and Wayne Ferry; and brothers and sisters in England, Mrs. A. Appleton and Miss Mary Ferry, Sunderland, Robert Ferry of Fence Houses, Durham, Mrs. Jack Davison of Carlisle, Cumberland and George Ferry of Dartmouth, Devon. Mr. and Mrs. George Ferry were also Georgetown residents for several years, moved to Toronto and returned to England to live.

Attend Anniversary For Historic "Stone" Church

Rev. and Mrs. Alex Calder had a most interesting Sunday this week when they attended the one hundred and twenty-fifth anniversary services of the "Old Stone Church" in Beaverton, Mr. Calder's birthplace.

The Old Stone Church was the first in the district. It was built for worship by a small group of Scottish settlers who came from the Isle of Islay, off the coast of Scotland who had first settled in North Carolina but being dissatisfied with the slave question they moved up to Thorax Township.

The church itself is of rectangular shape built of stone, it has a gallery all around it, box pews and an elevated pulpit. It has never been painted and there is no modern lighting, and true to the old belief there is no musical instrument in the building, the services being led by a precentor or a choir without musical accompaniment. The old church is used now only for occasions such as this.

The scripture lesson on Sunday was read in Gaelic by the present minister of the church, Rev. Murdo McGinnis. There were still a few in the congregation who could understand it. A former moderator of the General Assembly, Dr. W. A. Cameron of Toronto conducted this historical service.

Mrs. Margaret Wallace Local Man's Mother

A local man lost his mother when Mrs. Margaret Wallace, 70 died in London on July 26th. Mrs. Wallace was the mother of Frank Wallace, 32 Shelley St., who is associated with his brother-in-law Lloyd Marks in operating the Canadian Tire Store here.
