The complex problem began sev eral weeks ago when an offer wa submitted by Al Norton to pur chase the property for commercial use. His offer found favour with council, but on a split vote it was decided to publicly advertise the land so others could tender i they wished.

Subsequently council discovered that in the official zoning plan just adopted on recommendation of the Planning Board, the land is zoned as R3 residential. By this time, a majority of councillors had decided that the land is best suited commercial development. and the planning board was asked to reconsider the roning.


