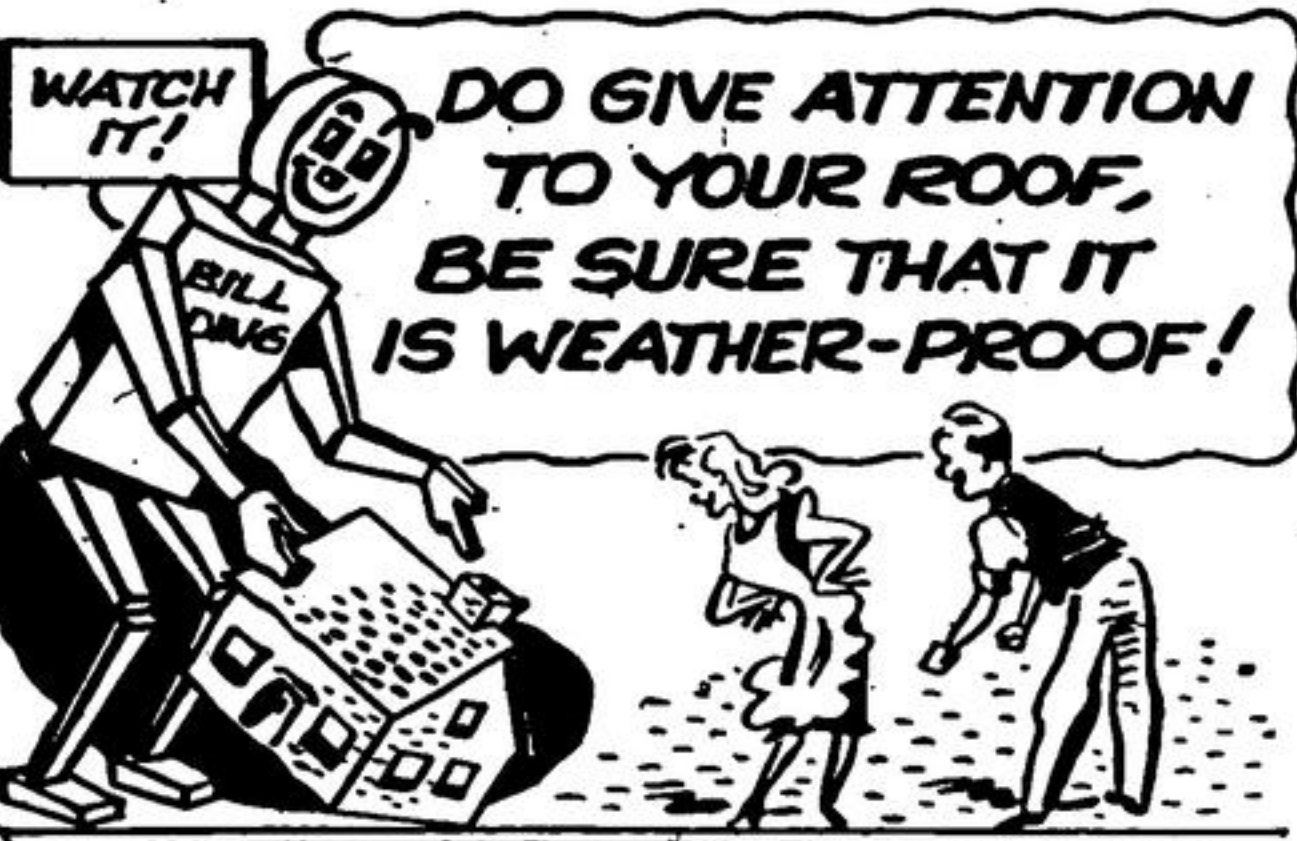

"My Fur Lady" Big Hit College Show Plays City

A college show is the 50th anniversary attraction at Toronto's venerable Royal Alexandra Theatre. Monday night, Aug. 26th, the theatre celebrated half a century of continuous presentations of the best from England, the U.S.A. and Canada. For the celebration, the Royal's manager, Ernie Rawley, is giving Toronto a Canadian treat, for the rollicking McGill University musical, "My Fur Lady", is entirely Canadian. It was written by three McGill law students who graduated this Spring, the music was composed by three other students with additional songs by McGill graduate Roy Wolvin, and the cast was drawn from students on the campus.

Originally the music was planned merely for the usual one week run of McGill's annual Red-and-White revue. This was last February. But so immediate was its success that it was held over a second week, laid off for examinations and revived for another 8 weeks run in the Spring. Montrealers made it a S.R.O. hit. For this revival, four of the originators and director-choreographer Brian Macdonald formed themselves into Quince Productions, a professional company. Then came the decision to play
