

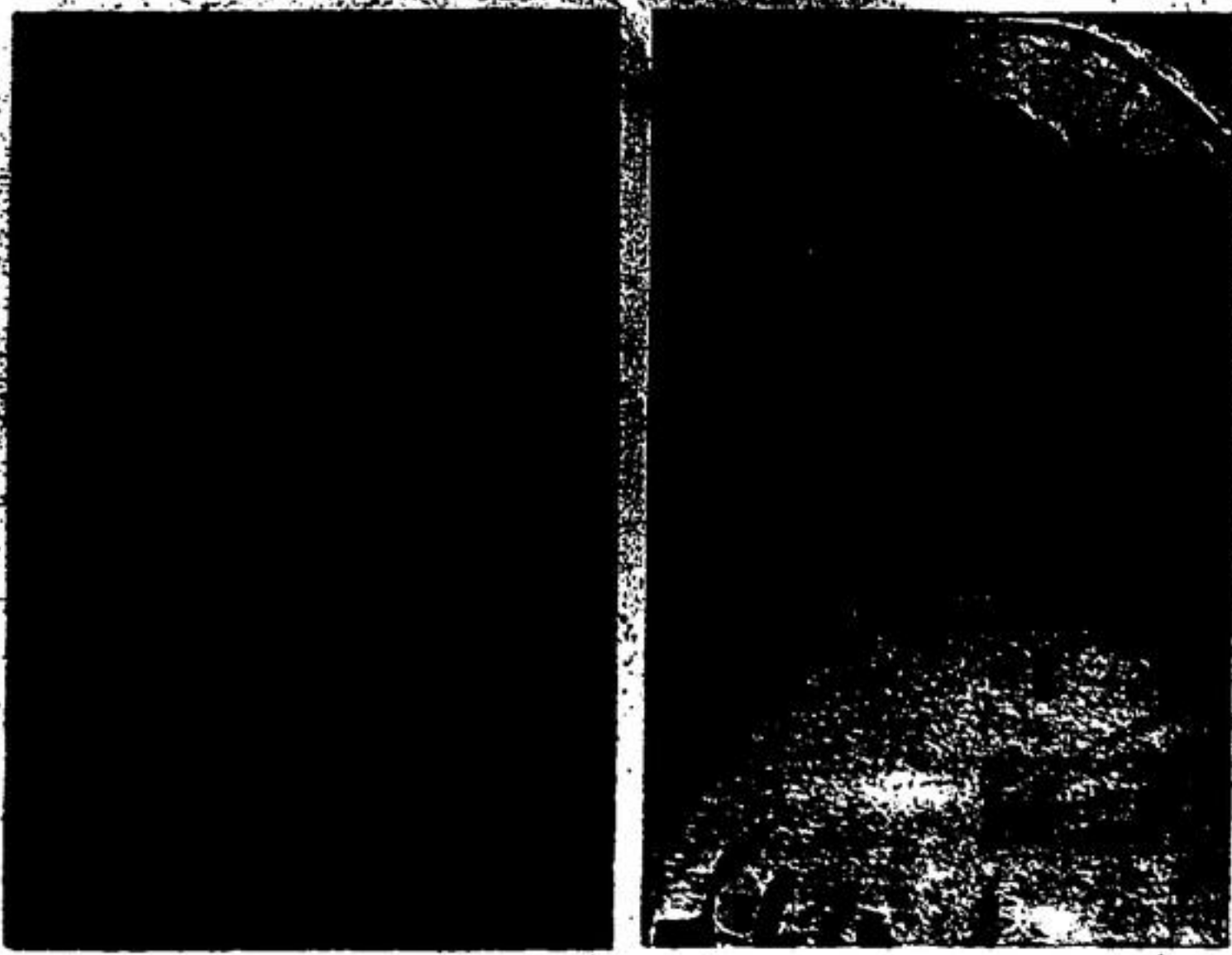

WHAT COUNCIL DID

Mrs. Oliver Carey is New Town Office Clerk

The staff of the municipal office was increased by one last night when Georgetown council engaged Mrs. Oliver Carey, Main St. N. as a junior clerk.

Mrs. Carey was one of seven ladies interviewed for the position at the meeting. She will join the present staff consisting of clerk-treasurer Clarence Benham, Mrs. Thomas Eason and Miss Jessie Leavitt.

"We're past the time when we should be doing municipal business without using more billing machines" was the opinion expressed by Mayor Armstrong during a discussion on office routine. Tax billing, he said, takes three or four weeks using the present hand method of writing tax statements. He suggested the system is not only time-consuming but monotonous for the office staff.

A drainage problem brought to council's attention by W. G. Sutherland, 66 Prince Charles Dr. was turned over to the road committee for investigation.

Mayor Armstrong, reporting on investigation of a suggested anti-noise by-law, said the town solicitor has written for a copy of a by-law used in Toronto, but has not yet received a reply from the city.

Council Will Support Toronto Opposed To Phone Rate Boost

Continued opposition to a proposed increase in telephone rates, was reiterated at Georgetown's council meeting last night.

Cr. Hyde expressed disapproval of a rate hike by the Bell Telephone Co. and it was his suggestion that council contact the Toronto city council, offering any help Georgetown can give in supporting Toronto's objections.

"We should oppose this, even if it costs us money to fight it" was Mr. Hyde's opinion.

Deputy Reeve Doug Sargent asked council to carry the matter to the Mayors and Reeves' Association.

A hearing on the request is scheduled before the Board of Transport Commissioners on Nov. 18 in Ottawa.

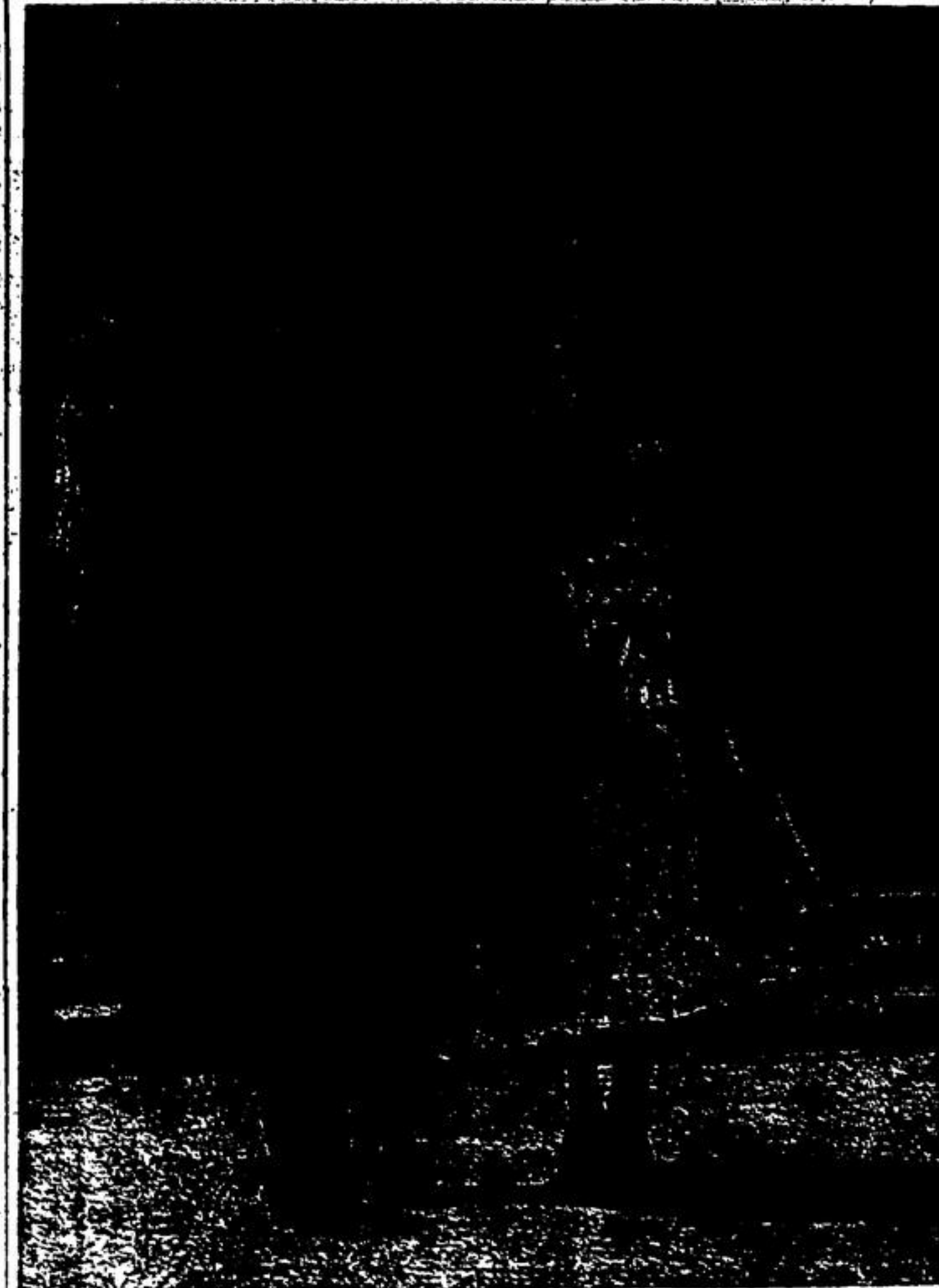
