LARGE CANADIAN HOLSTEIN SHIPMENT GOES TO PERU

One of the largest groups of purebred Holsteins exported from Canada this year has just left Oakville, for Peru. The shipment totalled 82 head of high quality first calf heifers. They were purchased by the Banco de Fomento Agropecuario del Peru of Lima for distribution to selected farmers in Peru with the object of improving their present herds by the addition of these foundation animals.

Each individual in the shipment is from a dam with a qualified Record of Performance production test made under the supervision of the Canadian Department of Agriculture. The service sires are also from similarly qualified dams.

The selections were made by F. Lira Zepa of Lima representing the Peruvian bank with the actual shipment being handled by Tom Hays of Oakville. The heifers will go by rail to New Orleans, then by ship to Callao, the port of Lima in Peru.

Belmont Royal Qualifies As Jersey Superior Sire

A Gold and Silver Medal Jersey bull Belmont Royal, 113421, has qualified as a superior sire. He was bred by E. P. Romeril and imported from Jersey Island to B. H. Bull and Son and used in the USA and he then came back to Brampton where he was used the rest of his life.

He now has 46 tested daughters in Canada that average 9,004 lbs. of milk, 479 lbs. of fat, with an average test of 5.32 per cent. His 55 classified daughters average 86.85 per cent.

Belmont Royal is classified Very Good, and he has sired many prize winners on Jersey Island and in Canada and the United States. He also sired the famous grand champion over Jersey Island Bel Respiro Jersey Lily 5th. A grand champion over Jersey in 1952 and 1953.

The sire of Belmont Royal is Royal Mail, a prize winner on the Island in the 1930's where he has 23 tested daughters that average 8,801 lbs. of milk and 470 lbs. of fat. Royal Mail was by the famous show bull, "Wonderful Aim", a gold and silver medal sire with 4 superior sire sons, and a long list of tested daughters. Royal Mail is from the cow Brampton X's Noble, that was classified Excellent and imported from Jersey Island to the Brampton herd several years ago. She has several good records in Canada.

The dam of Belmont Royal is Belmont Gilliflower with several records on Jersey Island including a Silver medal record as a junior 3 year old, with 9,161 lbs. of milk and 491 lbs. of fat in 296 days. She was a first prize age and first prize tested and champion, and breeders champion at St. Heliers in 1940.

She was first prize and Parish prize winner and Blythwoode Bowl winner at the Royal Jersey Agriculturist's Show in August, 1939, and many other prizes to her credit.

She is also the dam of Belmont Gilpin, a bull that was also used at Brampton where he is a tested sire.

Belmont Royal was brought into the Brampton herd as an outcross bull, and they have been exceptionally well pleased with the results that they have obtained through his use.
