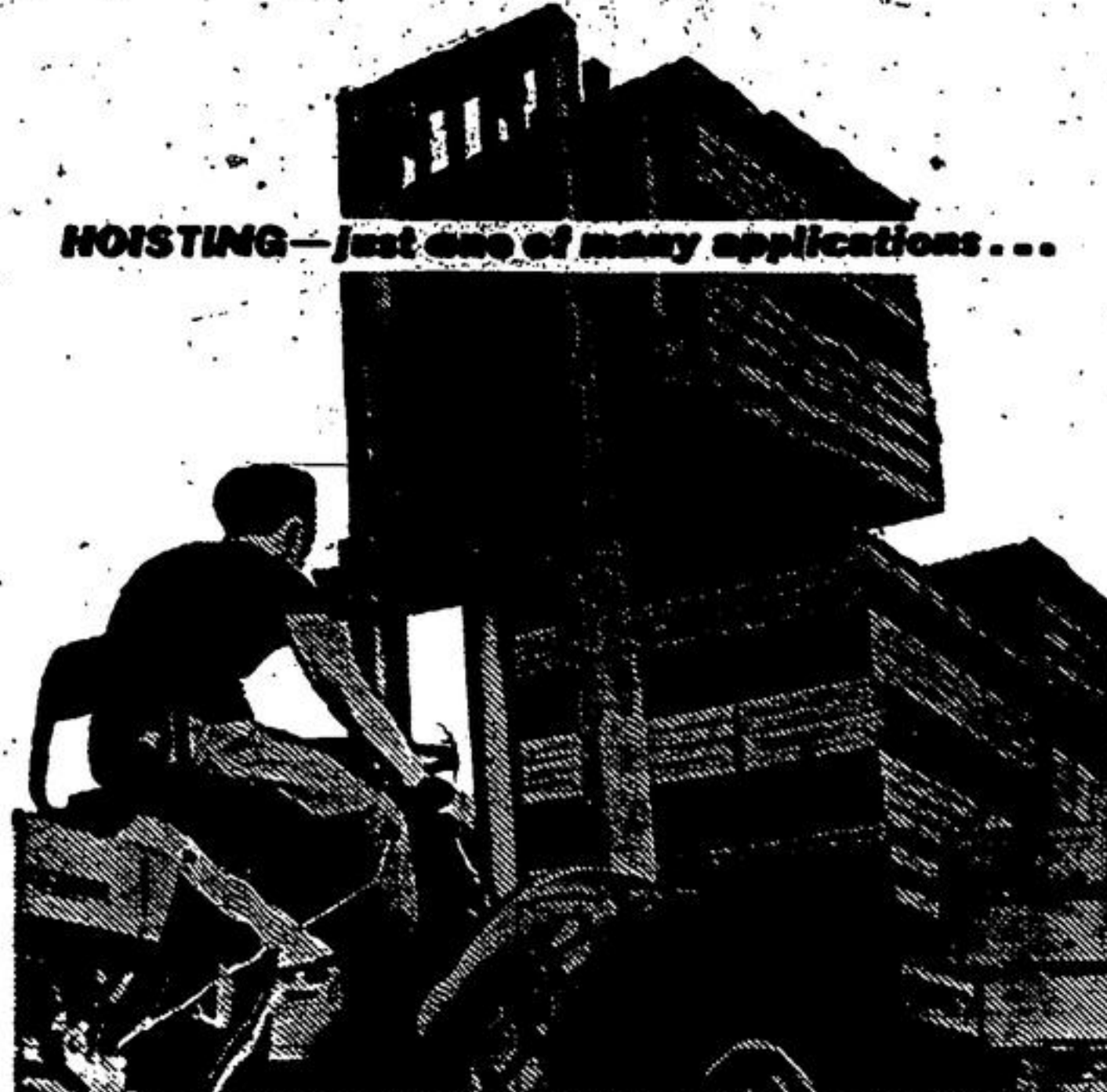

There will be no service in our church this Sunday so as all members can attend Bethel anniversary morning and evening services.

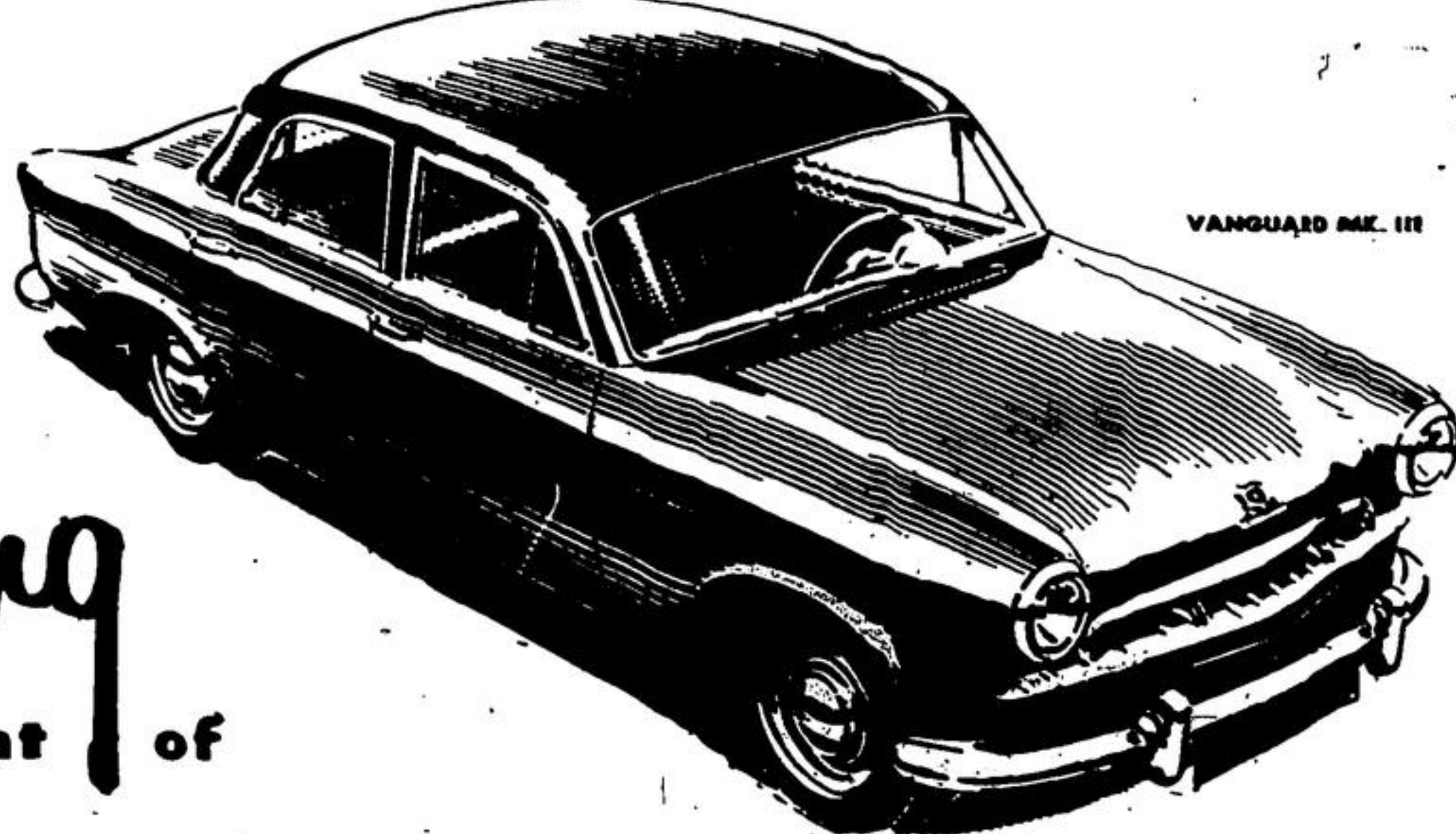

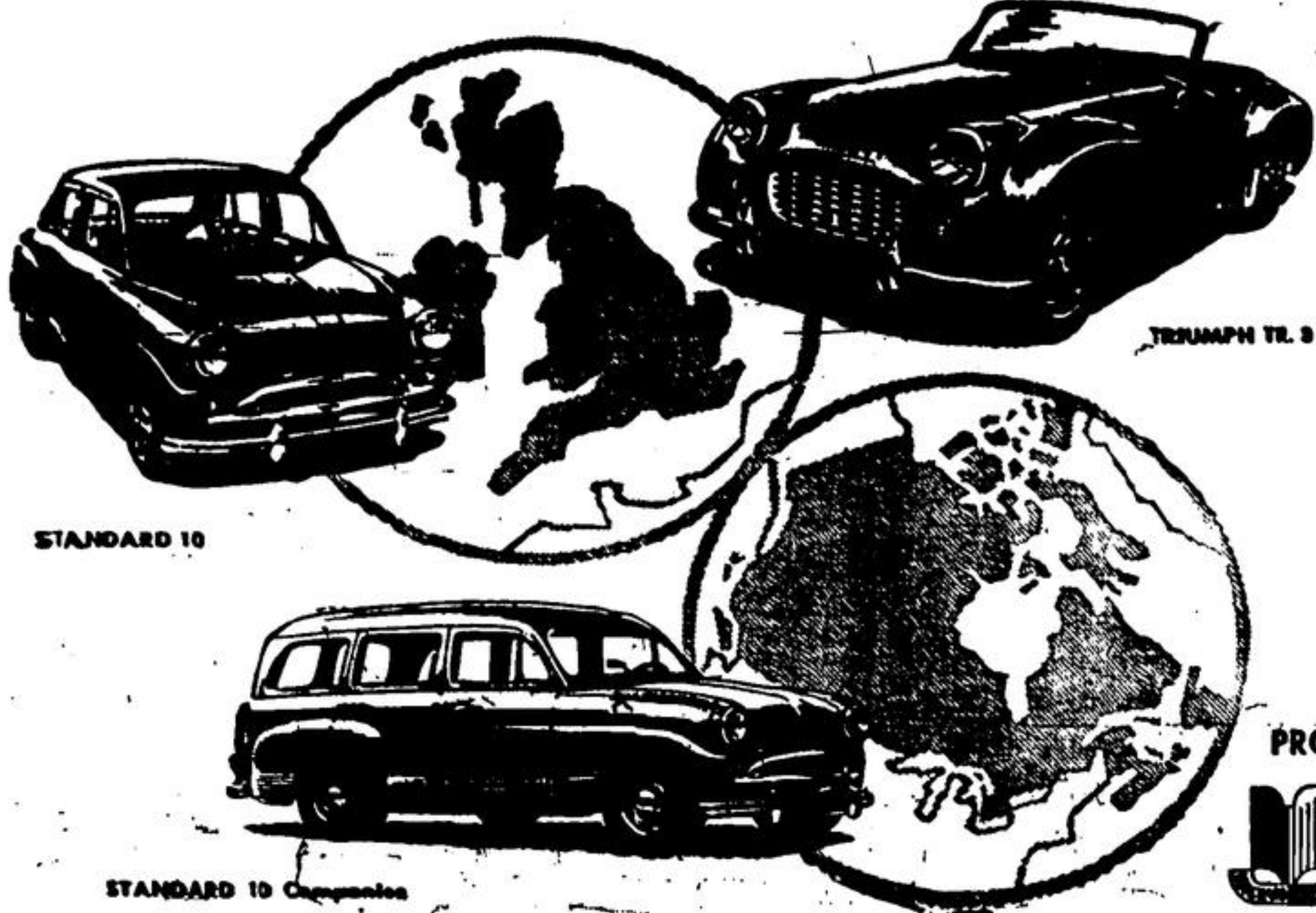
