Accident at Corner of Main and Cross Streets

A two car collision at the corner of Main and Cross Streets resulted when the brakes failed on a car driven by Dennis Hamdy, 5 Margaret St., as he attempted to stop at the intersection. Hamdy, proceeding west on Cross Street, applied the foot brake twice as he approached Main. When nothing happened he resorted to the hand brake but by this time the front of the car was well onto Main Street.
