For a room size 10 x 10 you would require 1/4" plywood underlay at a cost of \$10.92; ringed nails for same would be \$1.05.

178 linoleum tile in domestic weight would cost \$17.80; Vinyl on felt at 18c each would cost \$33.04; Vinyl and asbestos at 18c each would cost \$33.04; Rubber tile at 25c each \$44.50; Deluxe vinyl bonded on rubber at 35c each \$62.30. Cement would cost from \$3.05 up according to the type used.

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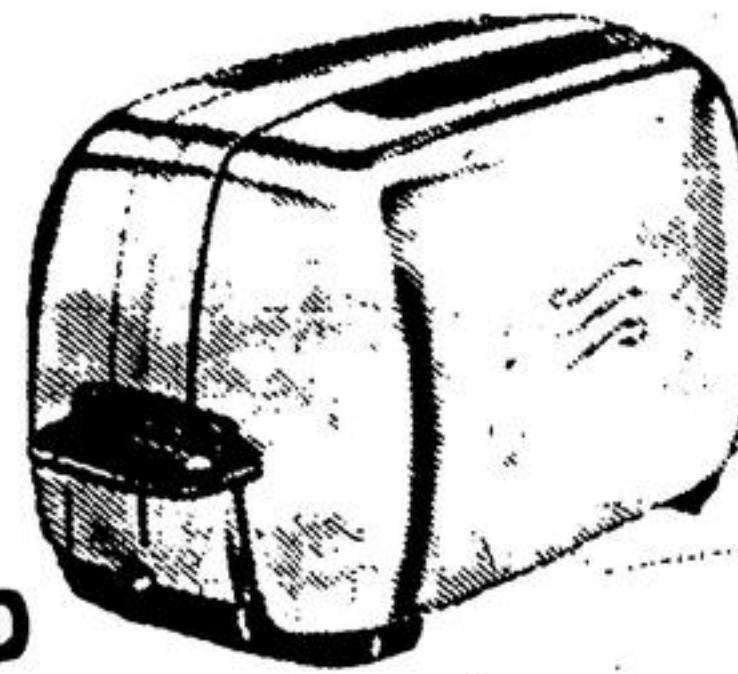
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
