Edward Guthrie was Fingerprint Expert

Det. Sgt. Guthrie, a criminologist whose sharp eye and patient thoroughness in comparing thousands of fingerprints solved many Toronto crimes, died September 15th.

The assistant head of the Criminal Investigation Branch of Metropolitan Police Department had a heart attack at his Cranbrooke Ave. home. He was 62.

Det. Sgt. Guthrie was born in Toronto, the son of Inspector Geo. Guthrie who died in June. Inspector Guthrie was a member of the famous brother team from Georgetown, Nat and George, who both rose to prominence in city police circles.

For 16 years Mr. Guthrie was a CIB civilian clerk. In 1938 he became a constable. He was promoted to detective in 1946 and detective sergeant in 1952.

He served in World War I in the 67th Canadian Artillery in France. He was 2nd past master of Wellington Masonic Lodge and belonged to Dowercourt Presbyterian Church.

He leaves his wife, Christina Ford and two brothers, Samuel J. and George S. Guthrie.

Funeral service this afternoon at the Trull Funeral Home was followed by interment in York Cemetery.
