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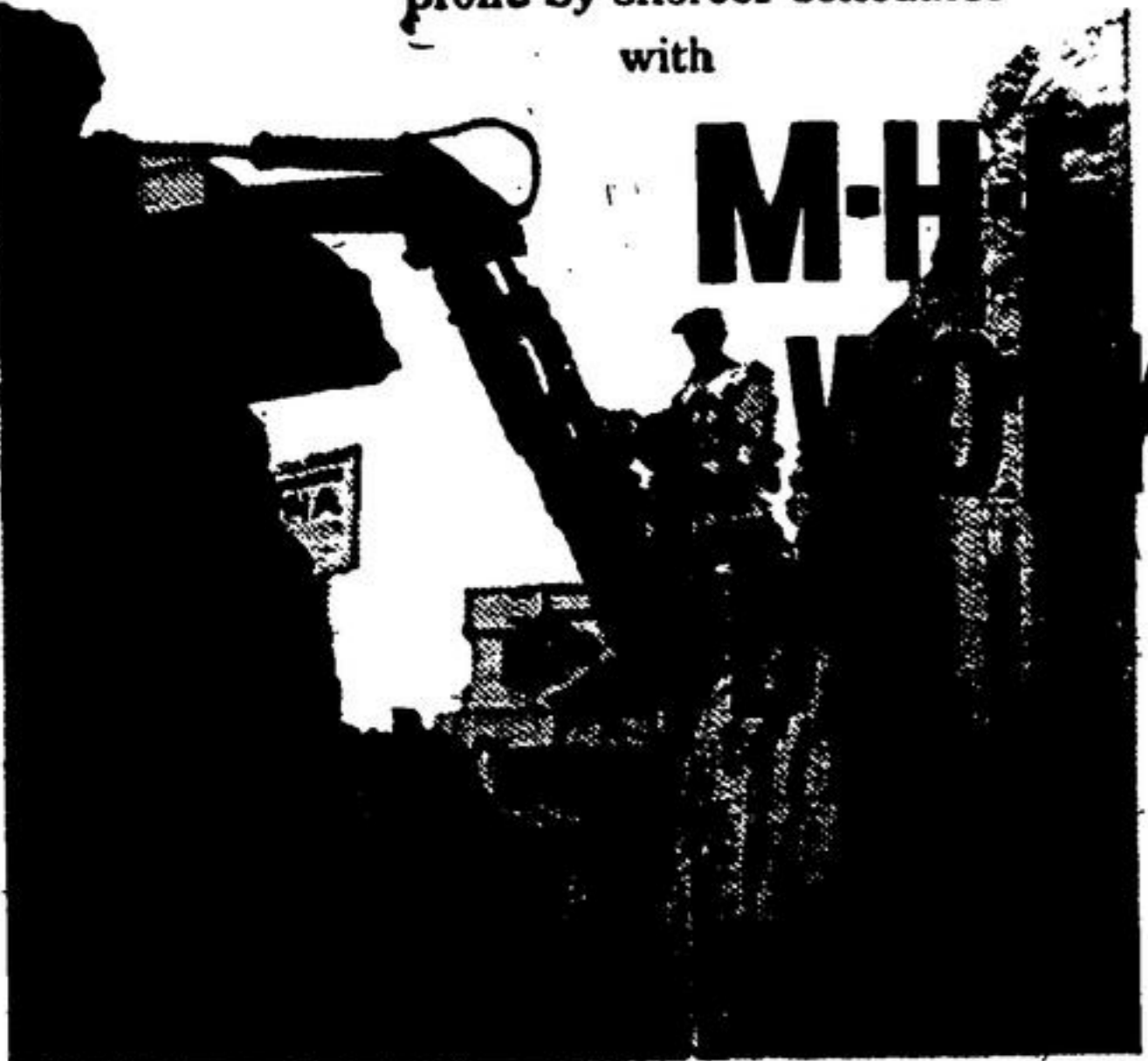
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Halton Shorthorn Exhibitors Were Prominent at the C.N.E.

"It was the strongest showing I have seen at the Canadian National Exhibition in the past 30 years," stated T. C. Amos of Moffat, in referring to last week's great Shorthorn show. As predicted in our column of a week ago, Halton exhibitors were strong competitors throughout. W. H. Merry and Son of Merrybrook Farm had the first prize cow in their 3 year old Merry Brook Augusta Maid, which animal went on to take the reserve champion honours. The same exhibitor had the grand champion Shorthorn steer in addition to a number of other entries well up in the money.

S. G. Bennett of Scotsdale Farm had both the Junior and Reserve junior champion males — the junior and grand champion female on his summer yearling heifer Scotsdale Letty Broadbooks, not to mention numerous other firsts and seconds.

In the strong senior bull calf class, T. C. Amos was second. Other Halton exhibitors who were well up in the money included H. Hendershot, Reford Gardhouse, and Grant Campbell.

In the special heifer calf classes for junior exhibitors, Denise Ridley of Scotsdale Farm was second in the senior heifer class. Bob Merry was fourth, and Carolyn Gardhouse sixth in the same class. No less than five Halton juniors competed in the class for junior heifers. Here Grant Baker of Scotsdale Farm was first, Jeffrey Agnew of Milton was fourth, John Black was fifth, W. D. Hendershot sixth, and Scott Campbell eighth.

As usual, quality was high and competition keen in Aberdeen Angus classes. Here John C. and J. H. Willmott made a nice showing. This new herd at Wilmar Farm took seven head and all were in the prize money, which speaks well for the foundation cattle selected by these new breeders.

First on his light draught Percheron team, first and reserve grand champion on his yearling stud, plus five seconds, two thirds and two fourths, were some of the highlights of the Achievements by Stanley L. May, well known Percheron breeder of Hornby.

Leonard W. Coulson, A. Roy Coulter, and George E. Readhead, all of Lowville, practically cleaned up in the Red Poll Show at this year's C.N.E. Roy Coulter had the senior and grand champion male, George E. Readhead the senior and the grand champion female, and Leonard Coulson the junior champion female, to mention but a few of their top awards.

At the conclusion of this business period, an organizational period, conducted by Stanley Allen, the new superintendent at the Manor in very able fashion, resulted in the following slate of officers, all elected by acclamation.

Director, Mrs. Stewart Lockie; assistant director, Mrs. Stanley Allen; social convener, Mrs. Mary Shaw; treasurer, Mrs. Laura Smith; secretary, Muriel Thompson; advisory council of three; Mrs. Hazel Smith, Hilda Marcy and William Hughes.

Before vacating the chair in honor of Mrs. Lockie, the new director, Mr. Allen outlined some projects in cabinet making that he hopes to have accomplished by Christmas time with the aid of the men residents.

With Mrs. Lockie in the chair, an open discussion on such pertinent topics as the hours during which the meetings are to be held, the financing of the activities of the class, displays of work accomplished and social afternoons, was held.

The singing of a round, Row, Row, Row your Boat, a contest based on the names of flowers and the repeating of the Mizpah benediction brought this very successful organizational meeting to a close.
