of citizens to protest. Such is far from the case, of course, for the editorial was designed more to point out the dificulties which a school board faces in a growing town, and a plea to leave major decisions to these elected representatives, rather

than denying the right of criticism to ratepayers We accept the criticism of the letter writers, and hope that in future, they and others will express their views in print. A newspaper isn't a one-man job, by any means, and a combination of opinions, intelligently expressed will make the Herald of greater value as a sounding board for public opinion.
