"Salute to Women Who Work" is the theme for Business Women's Week, in which the local Business and Professional Women's Club is cooperating with similar organizations in Canada and the States.

Last night, Knox Church auditorium was filled to hear Lisa Sergio, one of the most distinguished guests Georgetown has ever welcomed. It was a fitting public gathering which the businesswomen had planned, and will do much to impress the value of their organization in the public mind.

While the club is designed to promote the interests of professional women and is not meant to be a service organization, the local group is not unaware of such needs. There have been donations to such things as the community swimming pool and Hungarian Relief, and members

have served organizations like the Tuberculosis Association in the X-ray clinic. And individually of course, club members are to be found working in the various organizations, church, social and cultural, where the benefit of their business experience is welcomed.

Objectives realized in the past year by the National federation include a federal Equal Pay Act and appointment of a Woman Commissioner of federal civil service. This year, also, Canada signed and ratified the U.N. convention on Political Rights of Women and another on the Nationality of Married Women.

The local BPW can be particularly proud that they play a part in such major activities as these, as well as their more localized activities in Georgetown and district.

How's Your I. Q.

A Chain of Office

Decision of council to purchase a chain of office for the mayor is something long overdue and will make a worthy addition to the dignity of public service which the office of mayor entails.

It is a custom quite common in Britain, which had spread into Canada and the States. Its idea is to provide a symbol which will pass on from mayor to mayor and become an integral part of the municipal tradition. It is planned to have the names of all past mayors inscribed on the chain in token of their service in the community.

It would be nice if council members could

also be honoured in some fashion, we think. As the list would stretch to hundreds of names, it would be impractical and prohibitively expensive to consider including these names on a chain. But perhaps, a "rogue's gallery" could be reserved in a portion of the municipal building where small, individual pictures of present and past council members could be mounted, and added to each year.

It would be nice for future generations to be able to remember such public servants by face as well as name.

Guess We Were Wrong

Two mail bag letters this week remind us of the perils of editorial writing, particularly when the subject is controversial.

When an editorial about the school system was written for last issue, we were unaware that a Monday night meeting of Home and School association and school board had had some effect in making the board do some pupil shifting and avoid staggered school hours for the time being.

More important, however, was an unfortunate choice of heading on the editorial which inferred that we have a fascist approach to municipal government and do not uphold the rights

of citizens to protest. Such is far from the case, of course, for the editorial was designed more to point out the difficulties which a school board faces in a growing town, and a plea to leave major decisions to these elected representatives, rather than denying the right of criticism to ratepayers.

We accept the criticism of the letter writers, and hope that in future, they and others will express their views in print. A newspaper isn't a one-man job, by any means, and a combination of opinions, intelligently expressed will make the Herald of greater value as a sounding board for public opinion.

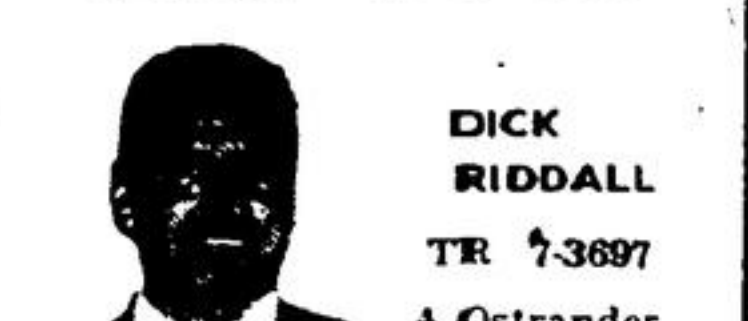
