#### TWO INJURED, CAR DAMAGED TRUCK - CAR HIGHWAY ACC.

A truck loaded with gravel and driven by Edward Lee, 36 College Street, was involved in collision on Friday with a car driven by Ron Brighty of 28 Hewson Crescent, when Mr. Brighty brought his car to a halt just east of the intersection of No. 7 Highway and the 9th line. The only injuries resulting

from the accident were a bruised left temple and jaw sustained by Mr. Brighty and a bruised left arm and shoulder suffered by his wife. The gravel truck was travelling south on the 9th and came to a halt at the highway intersection waiting for the traffic to clear before making a left turn. After allowing two cars to go by Mr. Lee started to make the turn not notice-

ing a third southbound car driven by Mr. Brighty. On approaching the truck, Mr. Brighty honked the horn and after passing the vehicle stopped his car with the intention of going back and warning the driver. The truck, which had completed the turn after the Brighty car went by, collided with the rear end of the standing vehicle. Cst. Nels. Trafford investigated the accident which resulted in \$300 damage to the Brighty car, \$25 to the truck.

#### Oakville Equalization Appeal is Dismissed

The town of Oakville's appeal against the Halton County equalization by-law has been dismissed and the costs assessed to the appellant. Reason for the dismissal, in the words of the hearing board chairman, A. D. McLaren, Q.C., of Barrie, "not enough evidence has been submitted by Oakville to prove that the equalization is not fair and proper."

"All the evidence submitted to date has only proven that there is some difference in the assessing methods used in Oakville and Trafalgar," he continued. "We can't base our decision on evidence which affects only Oakville and Trafalgar."

He explained that if Oakville had proven its point, the other Halton municipalities would have had to bear the expense lifted off Oakville, and in the board's opinion, the evidence wasn't sufficient to burden the other municipalities with part of Oakville's share.

First break in the case came when Oakville finished presenting its evidence by bringing in two real estate dealers - one from Oakville and one from Hamilton, to explain and assess land values and property values in Oakville and Trafalgar.

The county's solicitor, Harry Willis, Q.C., rose to point out that Oakville hadn't shown there was much difference between Oakville and Trafalgar, and noted that Oakville's share for assessment taxation wasn't much different from the past few years. He asked for a non-suit.

Trafalgar and Nelson solicitor D. A. McConachie agreed with Mr. Willis and explained that no difference between assessment of Oakville and Trafalgar's industrial and commercial lands had been shown. This, he said, left only the residential part or one-nineteenth of the original appeal to fight over. Summing it up, the solicitor quipped "Over half their (Oakville's) evidence has been given a decent burial by their own witnesses."

Georgetown solicitor John Ord argued against just a non-suit against Oakville. "I suggest Georgetown and the other northern municipalities stand in need of a stronger suit than a non-suit," he declared. "There must be a case proven. There must be proof that Oakville is over-assessed in respect to the municipalities it chose to burden with its share of the assessment."

Following this, the board adjourned for a brief recess, then returned to announce the case would be adjourned until Wednesday morning when final judgment was given.

In explaining the board's decision, Mr. McLaren reminded the court Wednesday that Oakville's share of the county assessment wasn't too much greater than in the past few years. He said "not much attention should be paid to the large increase in Oakville assessment in 1956. It seems to have been somewhat too low before, and they were only bringing it up to what it should be." This increase was a strong point of Oakville's case.

He said he was pleased to see that all the assessors in the county seemed to be working with the county assessor to bring about fair equalization and standardization of methods.
