WITNESSES ASK DOMINICA LIFT RELIGIOUS BAN ON SECT

Jehovah's Witness of the Georgetown congregation on Thursday, met to approve a petition asking the Dominican Republic to lift its ban of last July 25 restricting the religious activity of the movement there.

According to Mr. Dojzman, presiding minister of the Georgetown congregation, the lengthy petition cites specific names and places of police brutality that were personally authenticated by eight of the ten American missionaries, deported August 3 from the Dominican Republic. The missionaries related their experiences at a regional assembly in Baltimore, where the petition was originally adopted August 24th by 33,091 of Jehovah's Witnesses in attendance.

The petition was addressed to Generalissimo Trujillo, acknowledged dictator of the Caribbean republic, and named the Roman Catholic Church as sharing the blame for the government's atrocities.

Reporting on the action described in the petition, Mr. Dojzman said, "In one sector whole families were taken to prison and the male members of the families were beaten senseless before their own wives and children. Other male Witnesses were kicked and hit with rifle butts until they were bleeding and fell exhausted. Some were beaten and left unconscious on the ground in the patio of the prison with blood running out of their ears, and nose and mouth."

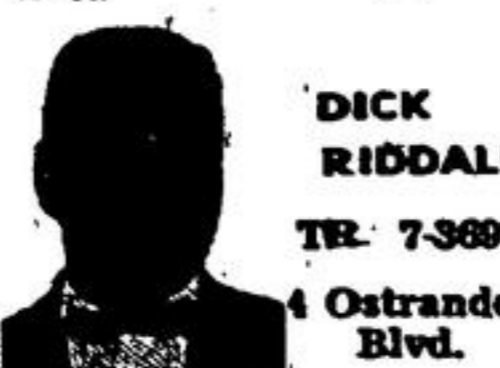
