Yugoslavia Places Third Big Order for Machinery

A third large order, this time for 1,000 Ferguson tractors and 6,500 implements, has been placed by Yugoslavia with the United Kingdom subsidiary of Massey-Harris-Ferguson. The company's total sales to Yugoslavia since the contract was made in 1955 now amount to \$18,375,000.

The first order was for \$9,975,000 worth of tractors and implements. In May of this year the second order amounting to \$5,835,000 was placed covering 2,200 Ferguson tractors, 12,500 Ferguson implements, and 240 large self propelled combines. The order just received amounts to \$2,565,000. Delivery of this equipment is to start immediately from Great Britain and is to be completed by the end of this year. All the tractors and self-propelled combines are fitted with Perkins diesel engines made by F. Perkins Ltd. of Peterborough, England. The value of these engines is not included in the above sales figures.

The original contract made in 1955 covering purchases in ten years for tractors and 7 years for implements and combines was for a minimum purchase commitment of \$10,000,000 and has been almost doubled in less than two years of the contract period.

The 1955 contract was secured after exhaustive tests over two years in Yugoslavia of equipment made by 26 of the world's leading manufacturers, with companies for North America and Europe competing for this business.

The Yugoslavs decided to standardize on tractors, combines, and other equipment made by Massey-Harris-Ferguson and on the Perkins diesel engines to power these machines.

The Ferguson tractor is proving very popular with Yugoslav farmers who have shown marked preference for this equipment over material from Eastern Europe. The after sales service arrangements made by the two British companies are superior to any previously known in Yugoslavia and Massey-Harris-Ferguson have a number of resident technicians in that country advising in the establishment of a national network of service stations and spare parts depots.
