### Brantford Nurse Was Sister of Mrs. Stein

Helen Florence Westbrook, R.N. of 76 Strathcona Ave., Brantford, died on Thursday at St. Joseph's Mercy Hospital, Ann Arbor, Michigan.

Miss Westbrook was born in Brant County, the daughter of Albert and Clara Williams Westbrook, and had been a resident of Brantford and district most of her life. She graduated from Brantford General Hospital with the degree of R.N. and practiced nursing in the University Hospital at Ann Arbor from 1926 to 1941, and in Detroit from 1941 until 1946. Since returning to Brantford in September, 1956, on her retirement, Miss Westbrook had served on the staff of St. Joseph's Hospital there.

She was a member of St. Paul's Cathedral (Episcopalian), Detroit and had been an active member of the St. Barnabas Guild and was a member of Holy Trinity Anglican Church, Brantford, the Brantford Business & Professional Women's Club and the Alumnae Association of Brantford General Hospital.

Surviving are her parents in Brantford, and three sisters, Miss Gladys Westbrook, Hamilton, Miss Ethel Westbrook, Brantford and Hilda, Mrs. V. A. Stein, 9 Queen St., Georgetown.

Miss Westbrook rested at the Thorpe Brothers Funeral Home, Brantford where the service was conducted on Monday, with interment in Oakland Cemetery.

### G. Greenleaf Delegate National 4-H Conference

4-H Club members from all over Canada will be arriving in Toronto on November 16th for the start of the 26th National Club week. Approximately 135 specially selected boys and girls from Canada's ten provinces are expected to participate in the program which will include speakers, discussion groups and trips to places of interest. National 4-H Club Week is organized and financed each year by the Canadian Council on 4-H Clubs.

On Saturday afternoon the group will be officially welcomed to the Province of Ontario at the Parliament Buildings by the Minister of Agriculture, the Hon. W. A. Goodfellow. Following a conducted tour of the buildings, they will visit the Ontario Museum.

"Leadership in the Rural Community" will be the theme of the address by Steven Davidovitch of the Department of Education, Toronto, on Monday morning, November 18th. Tuesday morning's speaker will be Dr. G. S. H. Barton, retired deputy minister, Canada Department of Agriculture, whose topic will be "Agricultural Leadership and Canada's Interest in International Agriculture."

Other interesting features of the program during the week will include an opportunity to see the Royal Winter Fair, visits to Niagara Falls and to the General Motors plant, Oshawa, and several luncheons and banquets. On Thursday morning, November 21st, they will arrive in Ottawa for a tour of the capital city and Parliament Buildings before returning to their homes.

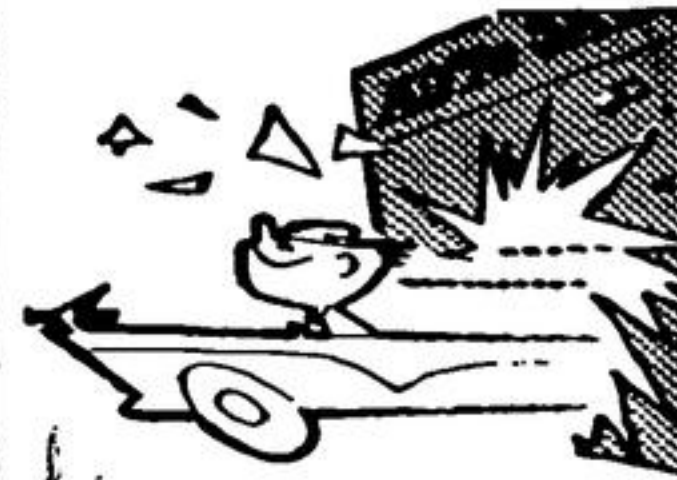
