Form Safety Patrols at Local Public Schools

The formation of a school patrol comprising grade 7 and 8 of Wrigglesworth and Harrison Public Schools was the result of a safety lecture given by local police constable Nelson Trafford at last week's meeting of the Wrigglesworth Home & School Association at which the Harrison H & S members were guests.

Introduced by Harold Marshall, Cst. Trafford showed two safety films to the assembly to demonstrate various points in the lecture, stressing the responsibility of parents in giving their children proper safety instruction.

Reporting on this year's accident rate, Cst. Trafford stated that police records show 83 so far this year, 19 more than were reported all last year, with the dangerous winter months still ahead.

The new Harrison school patrol will be stationed at crossings on Rexway Drive opposite the Harrison School and at the corner of Rexway and McIntyre Cresc. The Home and School associations agreed to back the idea by supplying the necessary equipment.

Public school children will receive safety crests of Elmer the Safety Elephant for their jackets when they memorize all the safety rules in a contest now going on in the three schools. Other guides to safety in the form of safety games can be picked up at the police station, for the asking. However, the supply is limited. These games are put out by the Ontario Safety League and were donated to Cst. Trafford's Safety Clinic by William Leslie, manager of the Roxy Theatre.

Harrison Public School is the only one still accident free this year. If they continue their record for the remaining months they will be presented with a trophy to be placed on display in their main hall. Graham Farnell who chaired the meeting, thanked Cst. Trafford, and a light lunch was served by the Wrigglesworth members.
