"Germany has come from rubble to riches in twelve years through free enterprise and hard work" stated Mrs. Morgan McFarlane in reading an article from U.S. News & World Report at the October meeting of Group 3 of St. John's United W.A. at the home of Mrs. Ian Ritchie, Orchard Blvd.

"Look back a dozen years at Germany, beaten in a world war, ground to rubble, occupied by foreign troops; leaderless and hungry" she said. "Look again now, twelve years later. Democratic West Germany has held its third free election. It is the industrial leader and money lender of Europe. It is bright with new homes, new factories. Its people are well fed, dressed and housed. Communist East Germany remains a dictatorship, a soviet colony of rags, ruins and hopelessness. Millions have fled to the west. One nation has made an outstanding comeback; the other still is a dismal failure."
