Choose Returning Officers And Poll Clerks for Elections

Machinery for the 1957 Georgetown municipal elections was set in motion last week when council chose polling booths, deputy returning officers and poll clerks for an election on December 9th.

The election, if necessary will follow a nomination meeting November 28th at which nominations will be called for mayor, reeve, deputy reeve, six councillors, a hydro commissioner and three public school trustees. A two-year term for hydro and school trustees, leaves one hydro commissioner and three on the school board in office next year.

The nomination meeting this year will be moved from the public library, its site for several years, to the auditorium of Wrigglesworth school.

Only one council member has indicated his intentions so far, and it is definite that Georgetown will have a new reeve. Reeve Stan Allen, who moved to Milton in September, is completing his duties in this office this year and announced some time ago that he would not again be a candidate.

Clerk-treasurer Clarence Benham will act as returning officer for the election. Voters lists are in process of being prepared now and will be off the printing presses within the next three weeks.

There is only one change in polling location this year. Residents of the Queen-Durham area will vote at the home of Fred Anthony on Durham St.

Smoke Damage but Fire Averted Funeral Home

A safety control which failed to operate on an oil furnace at the Harold C. McClure Funeral Home, 34 Edith St., was responsible for a serious fire threat early Thursday morning, averted only when the resident of an upstairs apartment investigated on smelling smoke.

Jim Jones, a McClure employee, was retiring after watching the late show on television when he smelled the smoke. On checking the basement he found the joist directly above the oil furnace in flames. The furnace itself was red hot and clouds of smoke were billowing into the other rooms. Mr. Jones doused the joist with a pail of water before turning in the alarm.

The damage was held to a minimum and resulted mostly from the smoke. The furnace is located directly beneath the main parlor.
