**Mrs. James Evans Presides at
Annual Teachers' Convention**

Attending the annual convention of Halton Teachers' Institute in Oakville on October 25th, public school teachers from the county heard Larry Henderson, TV commentator for the Canadian Broadcasting Commission speak on "Impressions of the Middle East and Behind the Iron Curtain." Mr. Henderson spoke to the five hundred teachers attending in the Century-Odeon Theatre.

Inspector L. L. Skuce gave a short address at the meeting also, which followed morning sessions divided into senior and junior divisions.

Mrs. James F. Evans, Georgetown, retiring president, presided when the senior group met in Oakwood School. Rev. J. C. Bothwell of St. Aiden's Anglican Church conducted the devotional exercises and Mr. S. Wark, chairman of Oakville school-board extended a welcome to the visiting teachers.

Brant County school inspector J. C. Webster addressed the group on teaching methods for arithmetic and Miss E. M. Deyell, who is school inspector in Wentworth chose "Are We Neglecting the Geography in Social Studies?" for her subject.

The junior division, which comprises up to Grade 3, met at Linbrook school with incoming president Frank Connolly of Maple Grove presiding. Rev. T. H. Smith of Maple Grove United Church conducted devotions and P. W. Merry, chairman of Trafalgar school board extended a welcome.

The division had two speakers. V. N. Ames, superintendent of public schools in Hamilton discussed objectives when teaching primary arithmetic. J. D. Londerville, principal of Hamilton Teachers' College chose for his subject in social studies "Wanted — Dangerous Teachers."
